22	1.	PREMIER POINT PHASE 3 FINAL PLAT DISCUSSION.						
23		Shay Stark stated Premier Point Phase 3 was approved by Planning Commission in Dec This phase is straight forward. The						
24		slopes are relatively gentle. The drawings are complete. There are 2 lots that were combined just before the Planning						
25		Commission as is shown on the newest plan. The final revised drawings showing the adjusted infrastructure for those lots						
26		and the line adjustment will be completed before City Council is to approve the phase in 2 weeks. Mayor Ellis asked what						
27		the slope easement line is. Shay Stark stated that the bank coming down into the back side of those lots is fairly steep. The						
28	slope easement line on the plat shows where they cannot build on the steep drop off, which defines the buildable area. The							
29	can put grass on it but no structures. The cul-de-sac is to code. There are no exceptions.							
30								
31	2.	AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE 10-2, PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT OVERLAY ZONE DISCUSSION.						
32		Shay Stark stated that City Council had requested that Planning Commission consider repealing the PUD. The Planning						
33	Commission approved removing the overlay in a public hearing on Dec. 14th. This will be an action item on the next							
34	Council meeting.							
35								
36	3.	AMENDMENT TO CODE 10-15C-2 SUBDIVISION DESIGN STANDARDS & REQUIREMENTS: STREETS						
37								
38		Shay Stark stated that this has not gone through Planning Commission yet. In looking at some of the situations that have						
39		come forward in various developments, there have been questions regarding road improvements and who is responsible for						
40		what; such as when developing a single lot does the developer/homeowner make the whole road or only a portion in front of						
41		their property. There needs to be something in the code that the city can follow. This amendment would go in the						
42		development code under subdivision; requirements for streets. The code does not currently deal with existing streets. The						
43		goal is to make it clear with the developers, if they are on an existing street, they that would be required to bring the street						
44		into compliance and classification. If they are tearing up the street they are to grind the road down one inch and put in a one						
45		inch overlay to repair the street. Item 4 is to require someone to complete the road in front of their property the length of the						
46		frontage with a minimum of 24 feet of pavement which gives 2 travel lanes. Or, they can finish the full width of the street						
47		for a portion of their frontage. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> asked if Shay knew why the city went to a one inch overlay to a slurry seal and						
48		was wondering if the city should get a second opinion on which is better since they most recent slurry seals have been a						
49		mess. Shay Stark stated that the city went to a 3 inch cross section of pavement instead of the initial 2 with the one inch						
50		overlay. He was not involved in the discussion/decision so he does not know why that was changed. Mayor Ellis stated that						
51		this would go to Planning Commission if the Council was in agreement. The council was in agreement.						
52								
53	4.	EQUIPMENT PURCHASE/DEPRECIATION DISCUSSION						
54		McKay Lloyd stated that they have a 2005 F150 that was placed on the surplus list. To replace it, they were able to get a						
55		good price on a single cab F150 2018 with zero miles. This would be for lighter duty jobs, meter reads, meter replacement,						
56		those types of lighter duties, and it is fuel efficient. List price was \$35K they were able to get them down to \$24K. <u>Mayor</u>						
57		Ellis stated the city had scheduled \$26K for a truck minus \$6K for surplusing the other piece of equipment. This comes in						

really close. Nelson Abbott asked if the city had looked at the state vehicle plan. McKay Lloyd stated that he looked at the Chevy Dealership that has the state contract and they are about \$28K. This truck is a better deal. Nelson Abbott stated that at SESD they pay for it up front and sell it at the end of 2 years for more then what they have into it. McKay Lloyd stated that on KSL this truck is \$30K with other dealerships. If the city wanted to sell like SESD then this truck would work for that. Mayor Ellis stated that he did not want to do that. Nelson Abbott stated that if the city has the opportunity to trade a vehicle out before it needs new tires then he thinks the city should do that. Mayor Ellis stated that the city does not have the administrative man power to deal with that. Tricia Thomas stated that a used truck would be cheaper. McKay Lloyd stated that they looked at used trucks. Trucks that they could use have 60K-80K miles on them and are about the same price as a new one. Buying on KSL is hard because private sellers won't hold a vehicle. Jared Peterson asked if the life of this truck, which would be about 10 years, is taken into account. McKay Lloyd stated yes, everything is based on life usage etc. Mayor Ellis stated that that they will be getting into all of that when they do the budget in March. Tricia Thomas asked if this was a good price on a truck. Jared Peterson stated that this is cheaper than he could get a truck for. All council members and the Mayor stated that it was a good price. Mayor Ellis stated that the truck is \$24K, reasonable truck, fits the need, 4 wheel drive, not a truck that will be pulling heavy equipment: With the addition of the recent public works employee he thinks that the city should appropriate some money from savings and purchase 2 of them. The city needs to have 4 trucks. The F550 won't be rotated out just yet. Nelson Abbott would like to know what the city has currently before buying an additional truck. Tricia Thomas agrees. Mayor Ellis stated that this needs to get to the council so that the council can decide what to do quickly. A poll vote will be held tomorrow for just this one replacement truck. David Jean asked what the truck will be used for. McKay Lloyd stated that it would be used for lighter duty jobs such as installing meters, meter reads, errands. It is much more fuel efficient than the heavier trucks the city has. Mayor Ellis asked if the city captures some of the funds from the water. Royce Swensen confirmed that a percentage is captured from the water.

#### 5. PAYSON WATER DISCUSSION.

<u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that the meeting with Payson went very well. The city has a joint council meeting with Payson City Council on February 20<sup>th</sup>, which is the third Tuesday. Payson will take some time to bring the new member of the Payson council up to speed and Elk Ridge will do the same. Some of the things that will be discussed is the boundary, potential line adjustments between Payson and Elk Ridge, and annexations. The meeting will be held at Payson City Hall at 6:00 pm. The purpose of the meeting is to start working out some agreements between the 2 cities. Lee Haskell has property in the county that may be annexed into Elk Ridge. It will be cheaper for Lee to annex into Elk Ridge and for Elk Ridge to provide the services to the property. The hope is to resolve some needs which both cities have and resolve issues with Lee's commercial property. The water discussion resolves around Elk Ridge providing water to the Gladstan Golf Course club house and the city providing water to that area. If Elk Ridge takes this path then it will be necessary to revise the Capital Facilities Plan because it will be Elk Ridge's infrastructure and cost which will be passed onto through impact fees. As Mayor Ellis previously stated, whether it is Payson's straw or Elk Ridges' straw it is being pulled from the same aquafer. Tricia Thomas asked what the council needs to know before going into the meeting. Nelson Abbott stated the council needs to think about how it is going to impact Elk Ridge and what the council wants out of the agreement. Nelson Abbott is not comfortable in connecting Payson until the new redundancy well is completed. Sewer connections need to be discussed as well. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that he would prefer to bill Payson for the sewer connections.

Discussion ensued boundary lines and infrastructure and making them work reasonably for Elk Ridge and neighboring cities. Discussion will continue on the February 13<sup>th</sup> meeting to prepare for the joint meeting with Payson.

23 24		<u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that he and Roger Timmerman, of Utopia, had both built a survey which are almost identical to each other. He will send them to whoever on the council would like to see them. Council decided				
25		that the survey should be sent out in February. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> asked if there is any way the data can be skewed.

33		sports program for the city. Her salary would be paid via funds generated by the program. Tricia Thomas

35	soccer with the younger kids, perhaps in conjunction with Woodland Hills. Concerns are there would be too

41	4.	PURCHASE OF BACKHOE DISCUSSION				
42	10	McKay Lloyd, Public Works stated that the lease on the backhoe expires the end of April. The state no longer				
43		has a contract for municipalities to rent or lease a backhoe. In 2016 the city leased a new backhoe for \$3800 a				
44		month. In 2017, when the state contract was dissolved the price tripled to \$9,300 a month. McKay is proposing				
45		the city purchase a backhoe. The state is making it difficult to capture lease money. The city can either keep				
46		renting the backhoe at \$9,300 a month or purchase one. Century, who the city currently leases the backhoe from,				
47 48		is willing to put the lease money toward the purchase price, making the purchase price of \$76,590.00 from \$89,730.00. The benefit of purchasing this backboe is they know availy how it has been used. To surplus				
48 49		\$89,730.00. The benefit of purchasing this backhoe is they know exactly how it has been used. To purchase a new 2018 backhoe from Century is \$88,550. The city's current backhoe has about 300 hours. Some other				
50		options, for example pulled from KSL, are a 2011 John Deere with 4000 hours is \$45,000.00, a 2012 with 2000				
51		hours is \$45,900.00, and a 2011 with 3100 hours is \$45,900. The bucket has been retrofitted for fork system so				
52		if the city gets a different backhoe then it will also need to replace the fork system. A backhoe with 300 hours				
53		for \$76,000 is the best option which is the current backhoe.				

54	Paul Crook asked if McKay had checked with any other companies like Caterpillar or John Deere. McKay
55	Lloyd stated that Caterpillar backhoes are about the same, maybe a little higher and he had not checked with
56	John Deere. Mayor Ellis stated that it would be hard getting the \$9,000 back on a different backhoe or the
57	other option is the city can lease for another year. Jared Peterson wondered why the older machine is priced
58	\$2000 more. McKay Lloyd stated that he had asked Century about that, because it felt inflated to him. Since
59	the state dissolved the contract the prices have dropped. A newer backhoe is cheaper in 2018 than a new
60	backhoe purchased in 2016. They will not apply the \$9,000 towards a new backhoe. McKay feels that if they

6. MONTHLY FINANCIAL DISCUSSION

<u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that the number of residents using Xpress Bill Pay has increased. The processor increased the expense in July and August a lot. The city has since renegotiated and the monthly bill is now around \$300 a month. In July and August the bill was \$1000. With the next budget there needs to be a discussion as to whether the city needs to implement a processing fee. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> asked if there will be an additional amount come in from the property taxes. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that there may be a little more come in but the largest amount has already come in. <u>Jared Peterson</u> asked about page 18, the sewer fund being at 811%. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that % will drop as the city captures more of the expenses that the city has budgeted for. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated the utilities for the parks; \$33K was budgeted and the city has spent \$31K to water the parks. There is \$1, 100 left to water parks through July. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated Skyhawk took \$8,000 of water in one month and they can't keep it green. The budget was adjusted for the new water rate. There are more areas being metered now than before. There will need to be an amendment to the budget. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that the city needed to figure out how to do the parks without lawn. <u>Nelson Abbott stated that "natural areas" are in the General Plan</u>.

- 50 Dave Tuckett questioned the total acreage for annexation. 51 52 Mayor Ellis clarified the entire area for annexation is the 54.89 acres. 53 54 Councilmember Hulet questioned why Elk Ridge doesn't want Mr. Haskell to build on the commercial 55 property already in Elk Ridge. 56 57 Nelson Abbott stated Mr. Haskell can build there, but it's taking a square peg and pounding it in a round 58 hole. Just because it's zoned commercial doesn't mean it works because over the years things have 59 changed. Housing development has occurred so there isn't a good buffer zone. They are trying to come 60 up with a solution that works. These facilities can essentially go anywhere they want. 61 62 Mayor Ellis clarified that there are access issues at the roundabout with the number of residents using the 63 roads. Mr. Haskell could build a better facility with better access and more appropriate traffic patterns 64 elsewhere. It is still an option for Mr. Haskell to build in Elk Ridge, which is prepared to move forward 65 if needed. Elk Ridge is looking for a win win for the residents, Mr. Haskell, and to not impose on Payson 66 City. 67 68 Dave Tuckett stated Payson sent Elk Ridge a proposed interlocal agreement that included some lots up 69 by the clubhouse and allowing then to connect onto the Elk Ridge water system until Payson has a water 70 system in place. Former councilmembers indicated that once the second well was up and running it could 71 be accommodated. 72 73 Mayor Ellis stated he personally believes the agreement needs to go forward. Those property owners have 74 the right to develop their property. Elk Ridge has the necessary water rights and system capacity to 75 provide those services. The council for the most part believes Elk Ridge can work this out. The agreement 76 is lacking and needs to address water, sewer, garbage, and snow plowing. He questioned who would 77 provide what services. He would also like to address lighting for dark sky area. 78 79 Discussion regarding agreements between municipalities can allow services to be provided by another 80 city or entity. Development are required to bring in water. 81 82 Discussion regarding the Fore Bay property. In the past, it has been mentioned that Elk Ridge has the 83 ability to veto anything that happens in Fore Bay or has 100% say. The property is owned by Payson 84 City. The interlocal agreement states, Payson also agrees not to annex any properties between the 85 southern Elk Ridge boundary and the area commonly referred to as Fore Bay without the written 86 permission of Elk Ridge. It is referring to the parcel in between the two. This language can be clarified. 87 Elk Ridge has many residents who use the Fore Bay area: it's an incredible piece of land. Elk Ridge just 88 wants to be involved because the traffic comes through Elk Ridge. Several entities have an interest, but 89 Payson City makes the bond payments. 90 91 92 Discussion regarding the annexation boundary. A discussion may need to be held with Allred's again. Payson cannot annex property for a long time if Allred's aren't interested and because of the agricultural 93 protection. Mr. Haskell wants to develop his property. Both issues can stand on their own, the Haskell

development and the servicing of the properties on Gladstan Drive.

Discussion regarding water rights. Question regarding providing water outside a municipality and declaring the water surplus. Elk Ridge has surface water rights that cannot be used so maybe Payson could transfer ground water rights and use the surface water. Joining the Mount Nebo Water Association may allow cities to work together better on water rights. They are larger than SUVMWA.

Councilmember Carter stated she is in agreement. The cities are close together and need to work together. She feels bad for Mr. Haskell who wants to develop his land and this gives him a chance to develop.

Councilmember Abbott stated the property owners should be involved in the process. Some have been very outspoken about where they do or don't want to be.

Mayor Ellis stated the water line for the golf course is galvanized and wants to get it replaced. He would also like to address emergency management services (EMS), plowing, garbage, disaster preparedness (CERT), and zoning for the area. Elk Ridge is going out to bid on the pump house to get the well on line.

Lee Haskell asked about moving the boundary line to the west of his property line so his property isn't split.

Conclusion that Elk Ridge will work on a new map and Payson will work on new language for the agreement to clarify Fore Bay, commercial, and services.

# 7. DARK SKY PROPOSAL DISCUSSION

47 48 Shay Stark stated that the Planning Commission had concerns requiring a deadline for residents to change out their existing noncompliant lighting. The Planning Commission wants all existing homes to be grandfathered in.

This will take place in with the building permit process for new homes or anything that requires a building permit. Discussion ensued on HOA feel and managing the impact of build out. # 8. BURTON SUBDIVISION, PARK DRIVE EASEMENT DISCUSSION

<u>Shay Stark</u> stated that this lot, which is known as the Burton Subdivision, is located at the curve on Park Drive going down into the canyon. On the plat it shows that the lot has to have a circular driveway off of Park Dr. It is in the process of being sold and during the plan check it was discovered that the land along and under Park Dr. is owned by James Winterton. The home builders went to Jim Winterton's estate (Gary Winterton) and is in the process of buying that piece of land. However, the road cuts across that parcel. The city needs to have this property for the city easement. The homeowners would like to access the property from Autumn Circle. The city has an implied easement but only as far as it remains in the original condition. The homeowner can refuse any type of changes to it such as widening the road. Since this is a subdivision he should dedicate this property to the city as any subdivision would have to do. If Winterton deeds the property to the city then the survey isn't as time sensitive.

Also, when the Loafer Heights Subdivision (across the street on Park) was approved, it was approved up to the existing road. With the Winterton property across the street, that leaves the city with a 15 foot right of way. If the city has the Winterton land then it still only gives the city 42 feet of right of way. That is smaller than any other cross section of road but there isn't any way to make it wider and being where it is the narrower road will keep the speeds slower on the curve. Winterton also owns the hillside going down Park Dr. into the canyon which needs to be reinforced. Shay stated that he would like to have all of this surveyed and the topography done on the hillside. The city needs to know exactly where all the boundaries are. The city can either ask Winterton he needs to armor and maintain the hillside. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> asked how much it would cost to survey everything. <u>Shay Stark stated that Utah County or Mountainland Association of Governments (MAG) might offer a service at a better price. Mayor Ellis stated he was going to the MAG meeting and would check.</u>

23		Julie Anderson reported on the soccer program. It had been very successful with 160 kids making 19 teams.
24		Most of the kids are from Elk Ridge and there are a few from Salem, Woodland Hills and Payson. Soccer
25		camp starts in May and T-Ball so far has about 50 kids so far. There will be some summer camps and that
26		will take us into fall soccer. <u>Tricia Thomas</u> stated that the parking at the Sky Hawk Park is hazardous. Either
27		the parking has to be taken care of or they shouldn't have games at the park or maybe space the games further
28		apart. There are cars on both sides of the street and kids are darting in and out everywhere. This needs to be
29		addressed. Julie Anderson went through various cities that have Senior programs. <u>Kristie Richie</u> stated other cities held their senior programs at various times: weekly, bi weekly and monthly. The program would need
30 31		funds budgeted for it depending on how often they meet; roughly \$100 per activity. They can only charge
32		seniors \$20. <u>Kristie Richie</u> said that the owner of Elk Ridge Assisted Living said he would bus his seniors to

39	2.	DUDLEY: WATER AND SEWER CONNECTION DISCUSSION
40		Shay Stark stated that the Dudley's were supposed to present their proposal tonight to the City Council but they
41		are not here. This is an overview of the issue. The Dudley's are building in the county above Elk Ridge adjacent
42		to the city boundary. They are in the process of getting the septic approved from the county. The Dudley's are
43		interested in possibly tying in to Elk Ridge sewer and water. The have 2 acre feet of water tied to the land and 2
44		wells. The city is trying to determine exactly where the wells are located. There are pros and cons to the Dudley's
45		tying into the water and sewer system. The city needs a water line into Loafer Canyon that is maintainable. The
46		city approached them about putting it down the Dudley's road (driveway). They are willing to consider granting
47		the city an easement for that. Mayor Ellis stated that he is concerned and frustrated about a septic tank going
48		into the city's protection zone for the well. The city needs to have communication with the County about
49		approving a septic tank in this area. Shay Stark stated it is zone 3 which the state doesn't prohibit septic tanks,
50		even though the city does not want it. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that he thinks that the Dudley's should annex into
51		the city to tie onto the systems. Shay Stark stated that if the Dudley's annexed into the city prior to building, the
52		city would not allow them to have a 1000+ foot road and the amount of fill they have for starters. Connecting to
53		the sewer is pretty straight forward, water is another matter. The city has a water line that goes up to service

those houses at the top of Canyon View. Some homes have long laterals to reach the line. This whole area is a 54 lower pressure zone. The Dudley's property is 150 feet higher, so it would be in a different pressure zone. One 55 of the things that was discussed with the Dudley's was that they would have to tie in above the PRV. You can 56 bring a line along Oak Lane and bring it up and over which is about 2000 feet of line which is roughly \$100.000 57 cost to him. Another option is tying the existing line into one of the existing property lines and getting easements 58 to run along the property lines and over to his property. He would have to work out a reimbursement agreement 59 with the other property owners. That would be advantageous to the city in that it would be in a high enough 60 61 pressure zone that when the line goes down into Loafer Canyon it could serve the lots right outside the Loafer Rec area. If it comes off the lower pressure zones it would not be able to services Loafer Canyon. Nelson Abbott 62 running a water line along property lines is difficult in case there is a break, it makes it very difficult to get to 63 even with an easement. It doesn't pencil out for him. 64 65

<u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated the only benefit to this is being able to get water to the south end of Loafer Canyon period. <u>McKay Lloyd</u> it also creates a redundancy down the canyon if needed. <u>Shay Stark's</u> concern is that if there is a fire at the Dudley's Elk Ridge would need to service it and with the water pressure and getting an emergency vehicle up there would be very difficult. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated the Dudley's are close enough to the sewer line they may have to connect to it the sewer. He may be forced by the county to annex that into the city. He is not sure if Payson would allow us to hook someone on to the system that isn't part of the city.

# 3. FENCE CODE AMENDMENT DISCUSSION

<u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that the Fence code amendment passed last year needs to be clarified and or changed. Section D has an "or" where it should have an "and". He drafted an amendment proposal, which is a compromise to the 25 feet setback and fixes the scrivener error, and would like the city council to send it to the Planning Commission to either be changed, clarified or both. Discussion ensued on safety issues and why the code was written as such.

35	1. <u>REPUBLIC PRESENTATION</u>
36	Reece DeMille of Republic Services stated that he was happy to be here and wanted to make Elk Ridge City
37	Council aware of the changes in recycling. China, has what is called the "Green Fence". Over the past 2 years
38	they stopped taking contaminated recycling. They started sending back to the US the contaminated recyclables
39	to be landfilled in the US and not in China. That is a huge cost for the recycling business and that cost was
40	passed on to the end users such as Republic. In 2017 China decided it could generate enough recycled
41	materials in China and by improving their recycling they would not need to import as much recycled materials.
42	China began cutting off imports which is known as the "Green Sword". China takes over 40% of the recycled
43	material in the world. China has an audit team at the port in the US now and if the recycled materials are
44	contaminated it does not even leave the US. Add in tariffs and the trade war and the price war, to get rid of
45	recycled material is now \$75 a ton. Republic takes MSW to Payson landfill for less than \$30 a ton. The recycle
46	materials is taken to South Utah Valley transfer Station and is then taken to Rocky Mountain recycling in Salt
47	Lake, separated and then they try to sell that product at \$75 a ton. That is why recycling is a disaster right
48	now. There are only 2 companies that except recycling material in Utah, Rocky Mountain and Waste
49 50	Management. In 2017 Elk Ridge had 90 tons of curb side recycling that Republic picked up. 90 x \$75 a ton
50 51	is \$6,750 which Republic paid to Rocky Mountain to drop Elk Ridge's recycling. There are 1003 homes, from Republic's last report, and 483 of those homes recycle, which is just under 50%. At this point it is not recycling
52	product anymore, its disposal. A good portion is garbage and is being landfilled: Plastics #3-#7 has no value
53	right now, cardboard does. Plastics #1 and #2, which are milk jugs water bottles, laundry soap bottle, those

have value. Aluminum and tin cans have value, but other plastics and other paper, (like this paper), have no value or very little value. The companies like Rocky Mountain and Waste Management have no place to sell this.

Mayor Ellis asked what the split of garbage and usable material was.

<u>Reece DeMille</u> stated that about 2 years ago about 25% was contamination. Today that has increased considerably. Republic figured, 4 or 5 years ago that they would break even on recycling, now they are paying \$75 a ton, the price goes down somewhat as you get closer to Salt Lake. Reece DeMille asked Rocky Mountain what if water bottles, milk jugs, tin cans, and aluminum cans and cardboard were the only 5 things recycled. Rocky Mountain stated that would probable knock off about \$15.00 a ton. The process of taking out the other material is just too high. Elk Ridge's contract is up in December, as usual with the one year extension. Republic does not want to lose the city over recycling costs. A city with 1000 houses paying \$6750 for recycling is a big hit. Reece stated he has 2 cities that stopped recycling.

<u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated why is Elk Ridge recycling, with only such a low participation, prices are going up and no one wants the recycled material. Politically, some cities don't know how to take it away, some cities are willing to pay \$10-15\$ a month. Recycling is not what people think it is anymore when most of it goes in the landfill.

Reece DeMille stated that Republic owns Materials Recovery Facilities in Las Vegas which is one of the biggest facilities in the Western US and it is losing millions of dollars every month right now. There is a feeling that plastics market will come back because China can't do without the world's plastics. There is no crystal ball, the price could be \$75 this month \$50 the next month and \$30 the next month, no one knows. That is why most cities are not getting rid of the recycling program, although they have to raise the price. Some people think that the gray bin and the blue bin costs the same amount to dispose of. That's not true. The reason why the blue bin is picked up every other week and it's at 15 lbs. on average pre can. That's only 30 lbs. a month. The gray bin is going 4 times a month at 40-50 lbs.

<u>Tricia Thomas</u> asked how many homes Elk Ridge needs to have participate in order to do a recycling program. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that the price would go up considerably for just 100 homes due to the cost of getting the truck up here.

<u>Reece DeMille</u> stated that \$6,750 divided by 483 is \$13.87 of disposal per month per resident that is recycling; divided by 12 is \$1.16 per home per month that would need to be added to the existing bill (or .58 cents each time it's picked up) to cover the added costs.

Mayor Ellis stated that Elk Ridge already raised it as of July 1st.

Tricia Thomas asked if anyone has stopped recycling since the increase.

<u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that the change is when people come in and sign up for services, most are opting for a second can instead of a recycling can.

<u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that he doesn't feel that with the amount of recycling going into the landfill he is hard pressed to make people recycle. Those that want to recycle should.

<u>Jared Peterson</u> asked if there was an alternative, perhaps a couple recycle cans per street or something to that effect.

<u>Reece DeMille</u> stated that a community bin increases the contamination from 25% to 85%. The blue bins picked up are going to the sorting facility it is not going straight to the landfill.

Republic only pays Elk Ridge (and Vineyards) disposal fees so it is known what the contamination factor is for your city: Elk Ridge and Vineyard are not billed directly from the facility. Elk Ridge may soon be big enough to be billed directly.

Tricia Thomas asked if there is a likely that there would be another rate increase.

<u>Reece DeMille</u> stated that he really had no idea. The city will automatically do a year extension if Republic doesn't hear from Elk Ridge by October 1. It may be time to discuss the rates to be applied Jan 1.

00 <u>Mayor Ellis</u> likes the transparency of being billed directly.

01Reece DeMille stated transparency is why he is here tonight as well, so the city understands what is going on02with recycling right now and the associated costs.

03 <u>Tricia Thomas asked if it is possible to make people take the recycle can before a second garbage can.</u>

- Discussion ensued on how to increase recycling in the city and decrease cost, requiring people to recycle or not.
  - <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated in his opinion the city should continue to see what happens with the rates and how many residents are still recycling in Oct.
  - <u>Reece DeMille</u> stated that they can split the costs that they are covering right now. Elk Ridge would be charged \$50 a ton and Republic would pay the remaining \$25.
  - Mayor Ellis stated the increase already in place as of July covers the \$50. He would prefer it to run with the city fiscal year.
    - Reece DeMille will be in touch with Royce and the Mayor and thanked the Council for their time.

# 2. RIDGE MEADOWS PHASE 7 RELEASE FROM DURABILITY DISCUSSION

- <u>David Jean</u> stated that this phase runs from north of the roundabout down Elk Ridge Dr. and Silver Wolf to just below Pine tree Cove. The slurry seal is better. The company that did it will be back in August if the city wants to have any of the slurry redone.
- <u>Jared Peterson</u> stated that David can call him when the slurry is being done and Jared would shut them down if the product was not done correctly.
- Discussion ensued on the quality of work which has gone downhill. The work being done now is not acceptable. The developer needs to be told that work isn't going to be accepted if it does not meet the city standard.
- <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that he is thrilled that the slurry was even redone since it was way past the year durability and that the city had no leverage.
- David Jean stated that he has talked with the contractor and he has made it very clear that the work being done in the city is not acceptable.

27	Mayor Ellis stated that there are 2 contract offers from Republic. Since the city has less than 50% recycling the				
28	cost will be more. The charge to the city is per can is \$5.95 with over 50% recycling. Below 50% the cost is				
29	\$6.85 per can, which is a dollar more per can. The city charges \$8.20 per can currently. Currently the city is at				
30	48%. At that rate Republic quoted the city \$7.23 cents for the first solid waste can. That is providing we have				
31 32	500 2 <sup>nd</sup> cans. Currently the city has 260 2 <sup>nd</sup> cans. If the city can get 500 2 <sup>nd</sup> cans Republic will keep the rate for the first can at \$7.23 which is the current rate. The tipping fee is additional, which is being paid by Republic				
32 33	right now. If the city drops recycling and increases the $2^{nd}$ can to 500 cans then the cost will stay the same. The				
34	fewer recycling cans the city has the higher the cost. Right now the garbage and the recycling rate are tied				
35	together. The Mayor would prefer to keep them separate. There are several options to look at: the city can do its				
36	own garbage and recycling pickup with the city's truck. Maybe the city won't do recycling. If the city wants to				
37	stick with recycling, Republic will build into the contract \$7.23 for the first garbage can. Recycling is going to				
38	stay where it is if the city stays at 3% unless the recycling drops down. There will be a 3% year over increase for				
39	5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. This is all based on a 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ year contract. Republic can recoup its cost by raising the rate 3% every year and the numbers will been going up. Benublic will start upside down and finish right side on increasing 21/0/ to				
40 41	and the numbers will keep going up. Republic will start upside down and finish right side up increasing 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ % to 3% every year; minimum 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ , maximum 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ %. Other options could be Elk Ridge does its own garbage pickup				
42	and Republic pickups recycling or vise versa. The Mayor will send them all the details but he would like the				
43	Counsil to start processing the option of Elk Ridge doing its own pickup. <u>Tricia Thomas</u> asked about a previous

45	numbers do not reflect that. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that the "meeting in the middle" was up to the time when the

47	matter to him who picks the garbage up as long as it is the cheapest. Mayor Ellis stated that would be Republic.				
48	<u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that this will cause a discussion for rate increases. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that he does not

At some point in time recycling will be too high. Or we can force everyone to get a recycling can. <u>Tricia Thomas</u> stated that perhaps, as discussed previously, have residents take a recycle can before they can get a 2<sup>nd</sup> garbage can. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that he will send out more information to the Council so they can process the figures and options and that they will discuss it again next work session.

Mayor Ellis introduced Peter Quittner, the Emergency Manger for Utah County. Nelson Abbott stated Peter is the city's point of contact. The city goes to Peter and when he has exhausted the county resources he goes to the state. Mayor Ellis stated that everything that the Council sees on the street and in the canyon is due to Peter's efforts. Mayor Ellis stated that the barriers in the canyon are a temporary solution to attempt to channel any debris flow. Peter is here to answer some questions and give the council some details. Peter did a fly over with a drone today to look at the situation on the mountain. The city does have a preliminary post fire debris flow interactive map. Another important piece of this is to learn what the city's is responsible to do for the residents. Peter Quittner stated that there has been more work done then anyone can fathom. Elk Ridge is just one part of this situation which has effected a number of areas. 130,000 acres burned, which is huge. The whole county has come together to work together with absolute selflessness. The initial request for jersev barriers for Woodlands hill was 1300 feet and Elk Ridge had 600 initial feet requested. The cost for 1800 feet of jersey barriers was \$70,000. Jersey barriers are more expensive to transport then for the actual barrier due to the weight and size. The jersey barriers are virtually no cost to the city. UDOT had barriers fairly close by. The county takes the city's proclamation of disaster and then calculates the estimated amount that goes towards a threshold that the county has which is about 2 million dollars. A disaster starts and ends at the local level. When a disaster happens in a city, such as Elk Ridge, Elk Ridge owns it. The city will throw everything it can at it and when the city's resources are exhausted it reaches out to the county through him (Peter) and the county puts towards it what it can such as heavy equipment, operators etc. within reason. When the county has exhausted its resources then it goes to the state. Someone is paying for all this equipment and someone is trying to get reimbursed at the backend which is usually the local level-the city. The Utah Disaster Recovery Fund was created to help shoulder that responsibility in the beginning. The Proclamation the city did was vital in this process. The county was able to get a lot of things moving quickly. Mutual aid Act allows cities to give each other aid, which was incredible. The county has almost reached its cap on what is available.

The responsibility of the city is to its citizens. The question is always did the city do enough. Elk Ridge was 85 sparred the huge thunderstorms that have been around the area this past week, which if had hit here would have 86 been disastrous. It is impossible to know when and if a debris flow will happen. The key word is what can be 87 done that is reasonable. What more could have been done is a hard question and differs for each community. City 88 infrastructure is key. The county gets money to protect infrastructure, they do not get money to protect people or 89 homes. There are different things here in play. A declared FEMA disaster is when the county threshold comes 90 into play, right now the county is drawing from the Utah Disaster Recovery Fund. If a big disastrous event 91 happens and it does take out homes and roads then the county does have to meet the threshold which is about 2 92 million dollars. If Elk Ridge is hammered and there is 2 million in damages and nothing else has hit, the county 93 does not qualify. If all the communities work together and we all work, report and document correctly then it is 94 easier to meet the threshold. The county declared a state of emergency, which is impending doom, in order to 95 prepare the community. All the man hours, which were not originally on the clock, fuel etc. Right now the county 96 97 has not gone FEMA, they are using the stated disaster fund which does not have to paid back. The event is locally owned which means Elk Ridge is expected to exhaust its resources before it can reach out for help. Exhausting 98 resources does not mean depleting, there is a difference. It is a reasonable amount of money throwing a 99 reasonable effort to which the city's resources are impacted and you need help. 00

Video of drone flight: A gentleman on scene with the military, supers smart man, requested the drone flight 01 because he was concerned about built up debris. . He was looking at the drainage. The overall prognosis is good, 02 he was happy with what he saw. There is some debris coming down. One home was already saved due to the 03 measures put in place. Right now the trees are up but they will eventually come down that mountain. There was 04 no blockage or damming. Loafer Canyon is a big concern. There were a couple homes that were evacuated in the 05 south end of the canyon when the debris came down. The debris actually built a berm around the home and a 06 channel was carved out by the water. Mayor Ellis stated that his concern is how long the city keeps this road 07 closed. It is a main egress out of the city. It's going to snow and it's not in any shape to plow, it restricts the 08 emergency vehicles. Peter stated that when the snow comes it will help, it's the thunderstorms that are problems. 09 Snow melts slow typically. Next July when the monsoons come then there is a great potential for debris flow, but 10 this is all just a guess as to what will happen with precipitation. The city needs to go through the process of 11 waiting for all of the government reports such as the BARE Report to that will give the city an assessment of the 12 13 burn scar and drainage etc. so that the city may make an educated plan.

26		Mayor Ellis stated this is a replatting of what was already done to clean up the areas around the school				
27		property. There are no changes as was verified by the City Planner.

30		Mayor Ellis stated there are a couple of options 1). A 5 1/2 year option 2). 1 1/2 year option 3). Extend what we				
31		have for another year. This would be adjusted to bring it up to the 1 1/2 year price option since the city is upside				
32		down right now. Payson has plenty of capacity for the city's waste. David Jean confirmed this. Mayor Ellis				
33		stated the city is technically on the path of just renewing the contract. Tricia Thomas asked if recycling ends up				
34		going to the dump will the city be notified and will the rates be adjusted? Mayor Ellis stated that when that

organization which can be done through an individual, municipality or multiple municipalities etc. That gets the NRCS started in order to contract with an engineering firm to do studies, reports and analysis on what needs to be done and what the assets at risk are. In addition to that, the city needs to be identified as a subunit of the county's sponsorship, which needs to be done formally or the city has to go it alone. The city asked where the letter or form is in order to be a subunit and that form is not ready. The county is in charge of preparing the letter. The city is responsible for 25% of the mitigation costs based on the report from the NRCS which could be a \$1,000,000, \$100,000, or a \$10,000 job. A million dollar mitigation job would cost the city a minimum \$250,000. That is the financial burden that the city will need to be aware of. Nelson Abbott asked if city is obligated to do whatever the report says. Mayor Ellis stated that he did not believe so; it is still based on the city. The County does have property in the canyon so they have a vested interest in this. Then after the NRCS figures out what needs to be done, they turn it over to the county to do the work. Then the county contracts with an engineering firm to put everything into place. By the time the first disaster survey report is done they have 220 days to complete everything in the project such as looking for anything like endangered animals, burial grounds etc. There is a lot to do. The NRCS does not do any work, they make the recommendations to the county on what work needs to be done. The mayor met with an engineering group that has worked with the NRCS in the past and talked through some of the process. They have not been hired by the county for this matter but it may help understand the process. They are supposed to contact David Jean, the Public Works director to go through the city where there is risk involved. The Mayor asked that David contact Glen from the Association so that their properties, springs etc. are included. A hydrologist is coming in and they now have a weather station up in the canyon. They are trying to get an auto-dialer in the canyon that would automatically dial those in harms way that rainfall has reached a certain threshold. Mayor Ellis is frustrated that they have still not received the BARE report. Loafer Canyon Road needs to be opened and ready for the winter months for snow removal and emergency services. Payson will help move the jersey barriers and they will be picking up their barriers. Some of the residents are putting their sand bags on pallets and he wants to make sure that they know what to cover them with. Any jersey barriers will be stored on the city property at the bus turn around. The city will help move the pallets off the road. The council is voting tonight to give David the authority to get the canyon prepared for winter.

# 6. POWER STATION GRANT FOR ELECTRIC CARS DISCUSSION

 <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that there is a grant available for an electric charging station. Elk Ridge is not a destination city except for going to one's home. The city would not be responsible for paying for the electricity, users are charged through an app. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> is concerned about paying for an impact fee but that might be paid through the grant. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that his concerns are maintaining the app, infrastructure, possible ongoing fees. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that unless the city is going to convert its fleet to electric he does not see the need. <u>Tricia Thomas</u> and <u>Nelson Abbott</u> both stated that other cities, where a charging station makes sense, could use the grant money.

## 7. RETAINING WALLS - CODE ENFORCEMENT DISCUSSION

<u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that the ordinance states anything over 30 inches above grade needs to be engineered. The issue is the new areas in town are built on a hill. They are having water problems from the properties above them running off and so they are putting in walls and are not getting permits. Royce Swensen the City Recorder is having to drive around and notify the property owners. <u>Royce Swensen</u> stated that the city does not have a code enforcer at the moment. Code Enforcement officer is more than a 15 hour a week job with all that needs to be done. Discussion ensued on when ordinances are enforced; complaint driven or by the city looking for infractions and how much of the tax payers money should go towards code enforcement. Should the city change from a part time to full time code enforcement officer. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that the city needs to change the code or increase the wage/hours for a code enforcement officer.

## 2. LETTER REGARDING NRCS EMERGENCY WATERSHED PROGRAM DISCUSSION

<u>Mayor Ellis</u> asked the council for their input. How does the city provide this information when the NRCS has not provided it? The city has yet to receive the BAER report, modeling, or hydrology reports. He will call Peter Quittner and speak with him about the letter and how they are supposed to complete it correctly without the information the city was told would be provided. John Curtis office has an individual that has dealt with the NRCS. He will talk with him and see what he says and if need be the Mayor will start pushing from the top down to get to the bottom of all of this and get some answers. The city does not want to lose the opportunity to be a subunit of the county. <u>Nelson Abbott</u> stated that the city needs to be proactive so when the legislature meets they will perhaps have this before them in order to budget necessary funds.
