38	there is a change to the budget the city must hold a public hearing which is published in a paper, and invite the							
39	public for comment. Tonight, council has the tentative budget for 2021-2022 budget. All land use issues must							
40	have a public hearing which generally goes before the Planning Commission.							
41	There is also a Public Forum which is an open time for the residents to make a comment to the council.							
42	This is not a requirement and there are a lot of cities which do not have public forum. This is not a discussion time							
43	but residents are allowed to make any comment they feel is needed. The agenda is set by the Mayor and can be							
44	left off the agenda at the Mayors choice.

Aaron Ludwig appreciates the work the council does on behalf of the city and is concerned over the loss of access to the mountain. His family loves the access to the mountain that Elk Ridge has and he is aware that current access

 is through private land. He is respectful of other people's property, but he would like access through it. He is requesting that the city look at all legal opportunities to open access to the mountain.

<u>Reuben Lisonbee</u> stated_Elk Ridge is a beautiful place. He was drawn to Elk Ridge because of the access to the mountains. He enjoys the mountains with his family, The views are second to none. It is a spiritual place. There are water pipes and utilities and a road that run up the mountain that the city put in. The tax payers paid for that road and would like to get some usage from the money that resident put into the road and open access to the mountains and take advantage of the views and the peace.

Gary Winterton stated that it is not Lighthouse Subdivision obligation to give me access to his property just only if the city council decides that it needs to be given. The City Council and Planning Commission has the obligation to look at the whole area before any subdivision is approved. He missed an opportunity when the 55+ development was approved. He apologizes that he was not here, that was his bad, but did not realize it at the time. It was his responsibility. He knows the city sent out letters, that is all you can do. He spoke with his attorney, and he believes that the city has an obligation to provide access and whether it's through Lighthouse land. He apologized again. Its is the cities obligation to provide access one way or another. He does not have to go out and buy a lot to get that access.

<u>Dan Towsey</u> lives at 55+ and is concerned about cutting the hilltop above his home and would like more clarification on how that will be done.

<u>Travis Tasker</u> would also like to be able to access the mountains as well.

REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING AGENDA ITEMS:

1. EAGLE SCOUT PRESENTATION; JAKE BUNTON

<u>Jake Bunton</u> stated that he lives in Orem but attends scouts here, where his grandmother lives because it is active troop. He would like to put reflectors around the roundabout and the islands leading up to them. He would place yellow reflectors at the medians and 3 feet at the medians ends and 10 feet on the roundabout and the islands Cost for reflectors is approximately \$1.70 each totaling \$600-\$700 plus adhesive which he would like to ask the city to help with costs and the rest would be raised in a fund raiser. This would be done on a Saturday and they would have to close the road. They would need to get requirements from an engineer. Mayor Ellis stated that in order to have it on this year's budget the materials would have to be purchased and in the city's possession before June 30. The labor can be done after June 30th. There is \$500 in this year's budget. The city needs detailed plans and dates to close the road.

2. FIRE DEPARTMENT RECAP: FIRE CHIEF WAITE

<u>Fire Chief Waite</u> gave a recap of the fire department personnel, calls and equipment. The fire department has a total of 27 personnel 3 EMTs resigned this week. Recruitment is always a struggle. Fire calls went up 21% EMS call were up over 100% 2020. 20% of the calls were from the care center. The fire Department is good shape and has almost everything it needs but it always needs more personnel. The fire truck is fully operational after 20 years. <u>Mayor Ellis</u> asked if the city would ever need 2 trucks. <u>Fire Chief</u> stated that by typing all the trucks that we have the fire department can now respond with the truck that was recently purchased as a 2nd truck. Discussion ensued on volunteer hours and documentation and the rating of the city and what it takes to lower the rating. Rating is every 5 years. There will be fire training in March/April 2022.

3. SURVEY PRESENTATION: RON GAILEY

Ron Gailey went over the results of the city survey held in May.

4. <u>LIGHTHOUSE HEIGHTS SUBDIVISION PRELIMINARY PLAT</u>

<u>Mayor Ellis</u> stated that last meeting the council approved the exception to remove more than the 7% cut that is allowed in code. The other issue was the distance of the cul-de-sac which was handled through Planning Commission. Drainage, cuts and roadways were hashed through last weekend. <u>Tricia Thomas</u> asked about access Gary Winterton's property. Mayor Ellis stated that the city has spoken with it's attorney and this is a civil matter between the developer and Mr. Winterton. Mayor Ellis stated that notice is sent to residents 300 feet of any

That is the opportunity to work with the developer to make sure they have access to their property. It is not the city's responsibility to call the developer and tell them they have to make access for the other property owner. This is a civil matter between landowners. This is not the city's place to negotiate with the landowners, this is strictly a civil matter. Royce Swensen stated that Mr. Winterton met with the city and Shay and the difficulties of developing that property.
