1. OPEN LAND PRESENTATION VIA ZOOM

Wendy Fisher Executive Director of Open Land (via zoom) has been working with Open 57 58 Lands for 30 years. A lot of people have come into the state because of the scenic beauty. Utah 59 Open Lands helps landowners/developers who want to maintain their property rights to preserve their lands, open spaces, and quality of life. Conservation easements are held in perpetuity. For 60 every dollar a city gets from residential development the city spends \$1.19-\$1.65, green belts only 61 62 cost .35-.65 cents. Open space, even a long-term stewardship of a conservation easement, does cost money and it takes time to ensure that the terms of the conservation easement are lived up to. Open 63 Lands is a Nationally accredited organization with the National Land Trust Organization. The 64 conservation easement legislation can be found in the tax code 57-18-1. There are court cases right 65 now regarding subdivisions that put in trails to connect the community with open spaces, the trails 66 67 are in danger because they were not properly protected depending on how the law sees things. Open Lands sees that open spaces are properly protected. Wendy Fisher turned to time to council for 68 questions. <u>Councilmember Thompson</u> stated the city has developers coming in and the city is trying 69 its best to accommodate their needs as well as the needs of the city. There is a significant interest in 70 trails and access to public lands, but the city needs to know how to do that properly. Are there 71 resources, codes, or materials to read in order to understand and do it right so that everyone gets 72 what they need? Wendy Fisher stated there are a lot of communities that have it written into their 73 code requiring community amenities that are factored into a development. It depends on the base 74 zoning, development agreement process, and negotiations on sensitive areas and trails. 75 Councilmember Thompson stated this is exactly what the city has been working on, clustering, 76 trails, sensitive areas, and access to public lands. Wendy Fisher will send resources and recent code 77 that has passed. One of the biggest mistakes is increasing density or increasing zoning for the 78 number of units per acre which mistakenly is thought to somehow result in open space, which is 79 never the case, it never happens. The city has to build into the code some sort of trade off. If you are 80 looking at clustered density, the infrastructure is going to be less costly to the developer because it 81 is clustered and in addition, they are probably clustering in an area that is more developable then the 82 other portion, the city has to ensure it isn't giving away the benefits that would result in ensuring 83 that they also have to maintain that open space. For instance, Heber Valley wanted to protect a 84 certain area that was zoned for 1 unit per 20 acres. They thought the best thing to do was to zone 85 another area 5 units per acre. But what they didn't think about was that there was no incentive for 86 someone to transfer the density from the 1 unit to 20 acres into the new zone and they didn't need to 87 up zone the property so there were no takings there, they actually just voluntarily up zoned the 88 property creating a windfall. You have to be mindful of not creating a taking when you are looking 89 at protecting these properties. You have to look at the over all geologic patterns and sensitive lands 90 and all the things that are pertinent to the community for health welfare and safety issues for the 91 community. Councilmember Willis stated that the code is being written and read the General Plan 92 93 density 1 unit for 4 acres or clustering with 400% bonus density. Wendy Fisher looked and sounded very concerned at this. Councilmember Thompson stated that is why the city is talking to Wendy 94 and she has summed up what the city has been discussing for the last 6 weeks. Wendy Fisher stated 95 she will come down to visit and speak with the city in-depth. Wendy will come down at a 6 pm 96 work session which Councilmember Thompson will schedule. 97

2. FIRE CHIEF WAITE BUDGET PRESENTATION

100Fire Chief Waite went through the past years' expenses, fire, and EMS calls. Based upon101population that has risen 129% which will continue to increase as the population increases. Assisted102Living gets 11% of the calls. Councilmember Thompson asked what the city can do help increase103fire department volunteers? Fire Chief stated that the payroll, which the council and he incentivizes,104helped but ultimately people think that fire department is "someone else's job" but they don't think

that they are that someone. It takes 3-4 months to become EMS and 3-4 month for fire fighter and 105 106 once a month training and certifications. They just have to commit; all training is paid for. If the city had just 10 more people on the department the city would be transporting right now, which also 107 brings in revenue. Discussion ensued on housing those on calls who live outside the city, but that is 108 dependent on number of calls. Fire Chief Waite is very open to anything they can do to increase 109 110 volunteers. Mayor Haddock stated Ron Gailey is in marketing and may be a good resource to speak with. 111 112 CAPITAL FACILITIES: SHAY STARK CITY PLANNER 113 3. Shay Stark, City Planner stated it is time to update the capital facilities plan. He sat down with 114 Royce Swenson and the mayor before this meeting and there are items that will need to be changed. 115 This will be a brief overview. The Capital Facilities plan is used all the time, by public works, and 116 117 developers when there are any questions with infrastructure, planning and budgeting. Not all the items in the Capital Facilities plan are impact fee eligible. This is the plan that justifies how much 118 and why the city can charge a fee and the amount of that fee. Shay Stark went through the number 119 of lots, parcels, sewer and water connections, and current developments in progress. The 120 121 Development Capacity Map was never intended for the number of lots per section as gospel, it was meant to be able to have a feel for worse case scenarios, based on zoning in order, to keep in mind 122 123 infrastructure needs. This has since turned into something it was never meant to be. While updating the Capital Facilities in the next year the numbers in this report will be used in order to plan for City 124 125 projects and needs. Discussion ensued on sewer connections contracted with Payson and protected zones and septic tank problems with the south end of the city and discussion on the health of the 126 wells and flow and future development needing another well for south development. If development 127 goes in that is too high up the mountain, then the city cannot serve them if the facilities are not in 128 place. Discussion ensued on storm drain and the possibility of embanking the Skyhawk Park soccer 129 field as a retention area. The city needs to plan what the priorities are and determine what is 130 maintenance and what is capital facilities improvements and put them in the capital facilities plan 131 for budgeting. 21	1. PUBLIC WORKS INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW
22	These are projects that Brandon Hundley inherited when he started the position of Public Works
23	Director.
24	Brandon Hundley stated the city spent a lot of money on the Scada towers, but he has no plans or
25	instructions. Part of the towers are in different places and the company will not respond in order to
26	get a diagram. There are 4 - 50 ft tower and 1 - 60 ft tower.
27	Brandon Hundley stated the PRV vaults on Hillside Dr also has no plans, engineering or how to
28	proceed. The vaults are in, but they are not installed. The vaults are too shallow. There are parts in
29	the vault, and the Anderson place that he doesn't know what they are. He needs engineered plans.
30 31	If the city touches a PRV the State has to be informed as well as State approval on the plans and then they can be installed. These PRVs are to replace the existing on the west side of Hillside and
32	the old booster station on Oak Lane. The PRV is supposed to be demolished as part of the booster
33	station project, but it cannot be until some other items are in place.
34	Brandon Hundley stated he has not been able to get RB up to finish the pump station above Oak
35	Lane. He has tested all the motors and they have passed the pressure tests, it's almost ready to be
36	online. They need to be online. They had reverse grade on the floor and all the water ran into the
37	cabinets, they removed the flooring which needs to be replaced and then a walk through is needed
38	with Aqua. The State has to approve this, and the city has to have a certificate of operation from the
39	State.
40	Brandon Hundley stated Ocampo Lane is paved now collars are being done and then restoration is
41	to be done on damaged property. He has no reference as to what it looked like before. The original
42	design was to eliminate the pipe that went into the properties which did not happen. Easements and
43	frontages were damaged, and the contractor is responsible for repairing the damage.
44	The contractor doing the salt shed is incompetent. Mayor Haddock stated that the contractor has a
45	deadline to get it completed. Brandon Hundley is making sure they do it correctly if they can
46	actually complete it. Discussion ensued on contractors, on call, pre-vetted, pulling bonds etc.
47	Mayor Haddock stated the city needs better contracts, performance bonds up front, requiring
48	licensing and insurance. Discussion ensued on pulling bonds, pre-Qualifying contractors- you
49	pay a premium for pre-qualified contractors. add to existing minutes. Brandon Hundley stated
50	fees for excavation permits need to be by the linear foot and fee per day on the authorized dates
51	of the work on the permit. Councilmember Peterson stated the city needs to find a Contractor the
52	city uses for all city projects

53		Brandon Hundley stated the city needs a new generator at Loafer to replace the current one and Sky
54		Hawk generator needs to be hooked up.
55		Brandon Hundley stated EPA Emergency Response Plan is a new report and was due December
56		31, 2021, He doesn't feel qualified to write it.
57		Brandon Hundley stated the state is requiring backflow prevention and cross connection on every
58 59		connection in the city in 2024. This is for city water, not sprinkler systems. <u>Brandon Hundley</u>
60		will get more info. This is required on every meter in the city. The lead on all lead lines needs to be documented. Galvanized pipes in the 70s and 80s can have lead in them. This is due starting
61		in 2023. Councilmember Abbott would like those plans in order to get this in the capital facilities
62		plan.

64	2.	CAPITAL FACILITIES DISCUSSION
65		Mayor Haddock stated the council needs to prioritize goals. Discussion ensued on sewer
66		connections on the south end of the city. Councilmember Thomas would like to revise the
67		Development Capacity map, because it says there are x amount of sewer connections allocated to
68		an area which is miss leading and developers can think they are owed those connections. There
69		are limited connections available. Mayor Haddock stated the city will look into buying some of
70		Woodland Hills sewer connections. Discussion ensued on possible future City Center in adding
71		pickle balls courts and possible park or picnic area on the city property located on South Loafer
72		Canyon Road after it's done with retention for fire mitigation/debris flow. Mayor Haddock stated
73		there's a 600 feet section of water line from Olympic Lane to the church that needs to be
74		replaced. It's feeding houses and needs to be a dedicated line for the pump. The sewer line needs

79		a grant writer located in Woodland Hills. Discussion ensued on parks, and the pavilion and
80		parking lot in Sky Hawk Park with bathrooms and a crosswalk to the park across the street and
81		possibly making the soccer fields into a retaining pond with grass berms. Storm drains need to
82		remain a priority. The water allocated to storm drain from the Highlands development project
83		will stay in place.

145 4. <u>FEE SCHEDULE</u>

Mayor Haddock stated the highlighted areas are the proposed changes to the fee schedule. The 146 147 proposed change to the excavation permit is to a Right of Way permit. If the road is to be excavated or impeding traffic in any way, if it's for more than 15 minutes: proposes a \$150 application fee, \$50 a day 148 149 for authorized days on permit, changing the bond to \$10,000 bond. Penalties are \$500 for working without a permit, \$500 for not implementing the road control plan as authorized, \$125 per 15-minute 150 151 increments going over the stated time. Councilmember Abbott asked who is fined, the homeowner or 152 the contractor. Mayor Haddock stated the person doing the work, the contractor. Discussion ensued on 153 basing the dollar amounts on the type of street, connector roads, secondary roads. Councilmember Peterson stated the bond needs to be based on the cost of the project. A \$3,000 driveway job blocking 154 the road shouldn't be a \$10,000 bond. Mayor Haddock stated Developments have to get the right of 155 way permit. Councilmember Willis stated main roads fees, like Elk Ridge Dr. need to be doubled. 156

Mayor Haddock stated the next item is the fee for amending a plat which is the same work and equals the same thing as a subdivision and proposes to increase the fee for amended plat equal to the subdivision fee of \$4800. <u>Councilmember Abbott</u> asked if the fee change for the amended plats in process will have to pay the higher amount. <u>Royce Swensen</u> confirmed they paid what was on the fee schedule at the time of application and no not have to pay the additional amount. Discussion ensued on the amount of the fines for riding motorcycles etc. in parks, trespassing. Councilmember Thompson stated the misdemeanor charges would be the deterrent, enforcement is the issue.

22	1.	Mayor Haddock stated Brandon Hundley, Public Works Director, has drafted a list of items that needs
23		to be done and or purchased.
24		Brandon Hundley stated his immediate needs have been worked through with Royce Swenson.
25		Finding prices right now is really hard because it's such a floating target. The generator cost is \$86,000
26		to \$100,000 just for the generator. Installation is separate. Pipe prices are being held for only 3 days.
27		Councilmember Abbott proposed doing budget amendments as the projects happen, up to X amount
28		and adjust afterwards to deal with those issues. Mayor Haddock stated one of the immediate goals is
29		the EPA/ERP; he and Royce will deal with this. There is no price attached to it yet. The software for
30 31		work orders etc.; <u>Royce Swensen</u> will see if the accounting software the city has will work. Salt shed is already in the budget. There is some electrical and some asphalt that isn't in the budget. Brandon
32		Hundley stated doors are \$20,000 total. Mayor Haddock stated the Sky Hawk generator is hooked up
33		and needs venting and electrical; the city is moving forward with this. Overflow at Fairway tank is
34		taken care of. Mini ex and Skid steer with trailer through government contract, no pricing yet.
35		Discussion ensued on leasing versus buying trucks. PRV at the top of Hillside needs to be engineered.
36		The vault is in, but it needs plumbing and submitted to the state with stamped plans; there is no
37		pricing yet. The older vaults need pipe upgrades. SCADA is in the budget and the city needs to decide
38 39		who will install everything. The city needs generators for the older booster stations. Discussion ensued on wiring the boosters and renting generator and the problems of being able to get generators
40		and fuel in a widespread emergency. One more generator needs to be on the shorter list. Flush Valve

- 51 <u>Mayor Haddock</u> stated the Presenter's for the next item have not arrived yet and will move on to the 52 Planning Commission report while the Open Land representative arrives.

54 <u>Maureen Bushman</u> gave the Planning Commission report. They are hoping to have a draft of the CE3 55 next month.

56 3. OPEN LANDS PRESENTATION

Wendy Fisher, Executive Director, Over Land's was given a brief history, watershed and topography of 57 the city and the general zoning plan for the undeveloped south end of the city. There are several ways to 58 do open space. Cluster zoning that has been successful has 1 acre lots that may go down to smaller 1/2 59 acre lots, but it spreads the open space out. 400% bonus density is a lot and needs to be readjusted by 60 excluding definite unbuildable areas and layering the bonus with aspects that will benefit the 61 community. You can require open space within each lot. Designate open space and have criteria in the 62 code. Conservation easements protect open space from being rezoned by future councils. Conservation 63 easement are a perpetual and binding document. The developer has to be told to obtain the conservation 64 easement. There is a charge for conservation easements in order to steward the areas. It is not a lot, but 65 the organization is nonprofit. The city needs to state that it is a designated area and that it is a qualified 66 land trust, and it has to be nationally accredited. Utah code discusses conservation easement. 67 68 Assessments for tax purposes are assessed differently in different areas. Contact the Utah County assessor or the tax commission for more definitive answers on property value and conservation 69 easements. The city can put into code that developers can gift open land to the city or put it into 70 conservation easement. Trails can be designated as open space. Acreage can be blanketed as a 71 72 conservation easement. Common lands maintained by an HOA held through the city trust or a private 73 HOA can be implemented. There are some tax assessors that don't tax those lands through an HOA, and 74 some do. Trust lands are never revocable unless through the courts. Applications for conservation easements are analyzed and have to be approved before they can enter into the trust. School trust lands 75 are not protected and can be sold off. Putting protections on an area can increase the market value as 76 people are willing to pay more to build and live in these areas. Contact Tim Watkins and he will tell you 77 the straight scoop of what has in reality worked and what didn't. The best recommendation is to contact 78 79 different cities to find out what issues they have had with protecting open space. Think about mixed density use, having some areas with 1/4 acre lots and different areas with large lots. There are trail 80 organizations that will come and analyze the area where trails would be the most beneficial and useful 81 82 and keep people on the trails and there are grants that can be applied for.
