75		everyone. There are numerous codes that need to be adjusted so they are enforceable. Councilmember
76		Peterson stated the paragraphs need to be separated out and numbered. The flow chart was sent to the
77		attorney, but we have not heard back on that yet. Discussion ensued on noise ordinance and what is
78		"reasonable" sound and at what time is a reasonable time for noise ordinance for nighttime hours and 7
79		am - 10 pm will apply to everyone. Discussion ensued on materials on the road and sports court
80		lighting and seasonal lighting times and enforcement. Discussion ensued on possibly setting a date
81		when the whole city has to become compliant with Dark Sky and seasonal lighting possibly moved to a
82		different section, so it isn't a grandfathered item to deal with it when it is a nuisance. On the 4-2A-3
83		MM add "and other noxious smells". The ordinance on snow removal needs ordinance prohibiting
84		snow in/across the road in order to enforce it.
