The increase in automobiles has hurt the downtown and the people living there. Do not condemn the upper side of Elk Ridge to be supersized lots with McMansions where only a few families go to at night to leave again the next day to where they really live. Let's make Elk Ridge a place where families can really live.

2. CENTRAL UTAH WATER CONSERVANCY DISTRICT DISCUSSION

Mayor Haddock stated this document is a recommendation from the conservancy. Councilmember Willis stated she spoke with Savannah Peterson from the Conservancy and the city does not match funds, the rebate comes from the state and conservation. The city can choose what it wants to adopt but it has to include items in section 4, B and C. There is legislation at the moment that may make this a mandated state ordinance. Discussion ensued on park strips and enforceability of the ordinance and inspections in the building permit process. Mayor Haddock will send this document to the Planning Commission since this is a land use item.

3. NUISANCE CODE DISCUSSION

Councilmember Peterson stated the version of the code was not the most current he recent it to everyone. There are numerous codes that need to be adjusted so they are enforceable. Councilmember Peterson stated the paragraphs need to be separated out and numbered. The flow chart was sent to the attorney, but we have not heard back on that yet. Discussion ensued on noise ordinance and what is “reasonable” sound and at what time is a reasonable time for noise ordinance for nighttime hours and 7 am - 10 pm will apply to everyone. Discussion ensued on materials on the road and sports court lighting and seasonal lighting times and enforcement. Discussion ensued on possibly setting a date when the whole city has to become compliant with Dark Sky and seasonal lighting possibly moved to a different section, so it isn’t a grandfathered item to deal with it when it is a nuisance. On the 4-2A-3 MM add “and other noxious smells”. The ordinance on snow removal needs ordinance prohibiting snow in/across the road in order to enforce it.
