47	years the city used 1,391,000,000 or 4,278-acre feet. Most residents are in tier 1, tier 4 is most commonly						
48	breached in July by majority of meters. Tier 7 is rarely breached. The next section is electricity. Since						
49 50	June of 2021 electricity ran around .11 (cents) to .12 (cents) per kilowatt hours to 21.6 cents per kilowatt hours 2023. On top of the charge for kilowatt hours there is a demand charge and a tax, and about \$50						
51	per meter every month. There are 3 pumps that have different rates in kilowatt hours due to the type						
52	of pump that is installed, when averaging the amount of all 3 pumps there is a 56.31% increase. The						
53		monthly power cost a	djustment	s went up 229%	. Projecting these figu	res for the rest of 2023 the effective	

54	rate will go from .11 cents to .18 per kilowatt hours which is about a 60% increase in cost. The city paid
55	\$100,000, it will now pay \$160,000 conservatively. Councilmember Willis stated when she was
56	reviewing the city payment for electricity last month there was a massive jump in the cost.
57	Councilmember Abbott stated the 4% margin is now gone. Ty Ellis continued: Sky Hawk well used the
58	most kilowatts. When a pump is turned on it creates a demand charge. For every dollar spent on electricity
59	in June, 72% of that went to kilowatt hours. 27% of that dollar went to Demand charges, .01 cent went to
60	taxes. In the summer the city gets more for its dollar because the demand charges are smaller. There are
61	options the city has, the tiers can be adjusted. By taking the per meter charge of \$905,800 divided by # of
62	residents a base rate of around \$62 a month. Where does the council set the base and set the tiers that will
63	cover all the increases that will come out of the next year's budget. Councilmember Thompson stated
64	council needs to come up with a new inflationary base to apply to all the water expenses to calculate a
65	new number that will give council a new base rate. Mayor Haddock stated there is also over \$40,000 in
66	upgrades to consider as well. Discussion ensued on where the amount of current inflation has been; 3-5%.
67	The city has 7.5 million dollars' worth of assets. The city financial director, Curtis Roberts, recommends
68	the city have one percentage of that coming in as revenue. Every percent is \$75,000, the city needs about
69	6% in revenue. There is \$450,000 in net operating revenue. Discussion ensued on the tier rates and
70	structure and how the water used is applied to the tier. Questions raised are: Should a home using a 4-tier
71	amount be billed a 4-tier amount for all of it or only the amount in the 4 tier? How does the city
72	incentivize and not punish? Is the increase going to cover one year or a 5-year increase? How much
73	increase is needed to not be in the negative? Ty Ellis stated the majority of users are in tiers 2 and 3.
74	Responses are to raise the base rate and adjust the tiers. A base rate of \$62 still requires a large adjustment
75	bringing all tiers down. The average bill will go up on average by 25%. Council will study the tiering and
76	base rate increase for the next meeting.
