**PLANNING COMMISSION UPDATE**

Maureen Bushman stated there was a presentation on permanent outside lighting and the Central Utah Water Conservation to better understand the program for on the incentives for saving water.

**PUBLIC FORUM**

Todd Larson stated the developer moved the retentions ponds which they are happy about, but they are still concerned about the 24" culvert on Loafer Canyon is too small and will result in flooding Washougal. He stated they were not informed about the development, and they would have been here at the beginning to speak about the issues.

Larry Lee stated Suggests sloping Park Dr (at the intersection of Park and Loafer Canyon) to go towards Loafer Canyon and not the other direction. Also, they are putting a canal down Loafer Canyon Road and there isn't any information to be found on this and the flow going down Loafer Canyon and feels like it's under the hat and they should be aware.

Ted Mickelsen stated he is working with the project which Larry spoke of. The program which you described that was on maps in the fire station was completed through the NRCS Emergency Watershed Protection Program. That project was completed and the information as taken down. They are now on the second part of the main project is under the NRCS Watershed Operations Program. The channel they had planned which went behind all the houses was not moved forward through the wishes of the city, all residents of Loafer Canyon had to approve this, they did not. Instead, they are going to pipe the water down Loafer Canyon Road which will not impact private property. These are long term programs which can take 3-5 years. There are 3 phases; phase 1 is preliminary, design, and environmental which includes environmental approvals. They are finishing up the environmental and working through some funding issues. Technical assistance is design which takes a year which would be 2024 then they have to reapply again for the construction assistance and that takes another year to 18 months, so they are looking roughly 2025-2026 to have this project started. There will be public meetings that will be held here in the city, and they will be informed. The state office of the NRSC states culverts under roads are not covered because that is considered a transportation issue. They are trying to address that and get it covered. This project is tied to the Pole Creek fire, existing issues like Park Drive would probably not be covered but he would check. The culvert under 11200 was reinspected and it is a 36" inch culvert not 24" as previously thought.

Kent Hart is grateful for the contractor for making this plan better than the original. The new basin will contain more water and taking out the dam on the top of the hill in Longview is a safer plan for homeowners.

Liz Carter has lived in Elk Ridge for about two years, is concerned that the city is not mandating infrastructure improvement in the whole community instead of just their land. Her and other resident's water pressure has gone down considerably but the city just approved a huge development above Elk Ridge and the water is just going to go down for everyone. She has worked with Salem and Salem requires a developers have to give x million dollars for infrastructure upgrades, and she does not see that happening in Elk Ridge. The roads are in poor repair. The developers are supposed to take care of damaged roads and is wondering when that is going to happen. Also, SESD rates have gone up and are the highest in the state and what can Elk Ridge do to create an opportunity to use another electric source.

Tori Black also encourages the city to approve the change to the basin in Longview and Highlands subdivision and also thinks the 24" culvert is too small.

Steven Clough Loafer Canyon has 2 threatening areas the intersection of Park Dr and water coming out of Loafer Canyon. There are accessory buildings that deflect the water into people's homes. There are people with walk out basements that have people living in them. We need to remedy this before this project is done. The water up in Loafer Canyon needs to be sent down the east side of Loafer. There is a ditch that is started. There are 3 homes that do not have ditches that is fanning this water out. We need to get the ditch finished and send the rest of the water down the east side. Anywhere there is a bend the minute the water hits a bend it's going to go over the low curb. All the water laterals have sunk as well as the curbing where the lateral is and that is where the water goes.

Ted Mickelsen stated the ditch that was proposed from the NRCS required an easement of that ditch to the city and there were some residents who would not approve it.

Unknown resident recommended a basin at the bottom of Park Dr and for all the property owners to put in a ditch.

Cory Thompson stated the city will not dig on anyone's property without the homeowner's property and for those residents to contact the city.

Tricia Thomas stated the city needs to contact an engineer to make sure the ditch or anything the city does is property done.

Jared Peterson stated the problem is you can't just have a ditch here and there it has to go all the way through and could be deemed temporary and it can't be changed. He was there during the fire mitigation and there were those would refuse it and it was free.

## **PUBLIC HEARING**

### **BUDGET AMENDMENT**

COUNCILMEMBER THOMPSON MOTIONED TO OPEN THE PUBLIC HEARING ON THE BUDGET AMENDMENT FOR THE REPAIR ON THE PLOW TRUCK. COUNCILMEMBER WILLIS SECONDED

Mayor Haddock stated the budget amendment is for \$6000. All councilmembers responded to the poll vote in favor of the amendment.

## **REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING AGENDA ITEMS:**

### **1. FLOOD MITIGATION DISCUSSION**

Fire Chief Waite stated he agrees with everyone. Putting preliminary efforts in place would be aid in someone calling 911 because water is coming in their basement window. He has been meeting with Payson since January concerning emergency management. The burn scar is a big thing with the city. There are 3 drainages areas that are a problem; 1) Loafer Canyon Road, 2) the ravine coming off of High Sierra that comes down into the 55+ area. The snow base is 20% higher today than it was in 1983. The snow content that is currently in Payson Cayon- 6 feet of snow has approximately 22 inches of water in that snow every foot. Pray that there is a slow melt otherwise a few 80degree days and we will get washed of the hill. He has put on the social media for people to watch the storm drains, they can get covered up with debris overnight. He has requested a map of the storm drains from Drew, they are hard to find if they are covered with snow. The 3<sup>rd</sup> area is the area coming off of the golf course onto Elk Ridge Dr. Has the retention pond in the school property prepared to hold run off after the breach? The big basin at the bottom of Golden Eagle Way was empty during the huge rainstorms last fall, where is that water going? That holds a lot of water, and it was dry. The city needs to get some sandbags available. Sandbags do not store well they deteriorate after a couple years so do not buy a

million, perhaps maybe 5,000 bags. The city could close Park Dr at the intersection of Loafer Canyon and place big pile of dirt to divert water down the east side of the road. The city also could put cement barriers, but they close the road as well. Recommending sandbags and set up some nightly patrols to keep an eye on the water. This needs to be a community effort. Someone asked about the CERT program. Fire Chief said that CERT was not functioning at this time.

2. **LONGVIEW MEADOWS AMENDMENT**

The retention pond has been removed and will be caught and sent to the basin in Highlands at the bottom of Canyon View. Discussion ensued on the rocks and where the road is blocked at the start of the new extension at Canyon View. Councilmember Peterson went through some items on the plans that needed to be changed to city standards.

3. **HIGHLANDS AT ELK RIDGE AMENDMENT**

The retention pond was moved to the other side of Canyon View Dr. Councilmember Peterson went through a lot of items on the plans that needed to be changed to city standards.

4. **CENTRAL UTAH WATER CONSERVANCY DISTRICT RESOLUTION**

Discussion ensued on what the city wants to add besides the 4 required points and how this would be inspected. Councilmember Willis will draft the resolution for the landscape code and clarify the 4 points required.

5. **NUISANCE CODE UPDATE**

Councilmember Peterson stated the attorney is still working on reviewing the chart and updated the council of changes and the Wildlife Harassment section which covers feeding wild animals. This will be an ongoing agenda item.

6. **WATER RATES**

Mayor Haddock stated the city financial officer, Curtis Roberts, stated the water rated need to be increased by 25% due to the increase in electricity. Councilmember Willis would like to have a public hearing for transparency. Council will ask Ty Ellis to come and present the water usage in the city. Discussion ensued on how the city can mitigate the cost and improve the efficiency of the wells.

7. **DARK SKY, SEASONAL LIGHTING**

Discussion ensued on the recommendation from Planning Council. Discussion ensued on the adopting the national dark sky code. Discussion ensued on whether dark sky works with all the valley light. The jellyfish type lighting is already against code and needs to have restrictions to meet dark sky. Discussion on how many residents really support dark sky and how can the city enforce it and want to do a city-wide survey.

164 Councilmember Abbott stated the water was only supposed to be for emergencies as stated on the first

167 non-emergency situation and should that be included in the agreement. Mayor Haddock will call and  
168 talk to Salem City Mayor about a non-emergency rate.
