## **TENTATIVE BUDGET 2023-2024**

Discussion ensued on whether funds need to be put into the budget to fix/remove the property at the southwest corner at the roundabout.

Councilmember Thompson asked why the sales and use tax is \$200,000 more than the actual? The figures are only through March and the city projections for April, May and June are about \$200,000. Councilmember Willis would like to do an easy-to-understand narrative of the budget so it's easier for residents to understand the budget and how much the city actually gets from the different revenues such as school tax, property tax, what the city's goals are and expenses. Mayor Haddock stated this is the first draft; a public hearing needs to be held at the first meeting in June. Page 3 the under highways is the plow truck is going to be about \$220,000 and a mini ex which cost is about \$90,000 which is split into different funds. Councilmember Thompson would like to budget funds for the planning commission. The planning commission puts in a lot of time for a volunteer position. Councilmember Willis would like the city council to have some discretionary funds for issues that come up like when an employee wants to take a class and pays for it out of their own pocket. Councilmember Thompson thinks it's a good idea but it can't be for pet projects. Royce Swensen stated there is a line between legislative and administration, council is legislative; administrative is not council's role. Councilmember Abbott stated employees need to go through their supervisor and then to the Mayor. A line-item fund could be added for educational funds. Discussion ensued on showers in the public works building for sewer breaks and washer and dryer in the fire station for bio messes. Discussion ensued on roads and if \$250,000 is enough or increasing that now or waiting to get the report from the engineer on the report for the roads and amend as needed. Discussion ensued on the \$350,000 remodel of the city office and the council/reception room.

Councilmember Peterson stated the copy tonight is the most up to date with the attorney's edits. Councilmember Willis would like to add a purpose section at the very beginning. Councilmember Thompson recommends putting the purpose in the recitals. Councilmember Willis on page 3 in section C.a. changing in any person to one or more person to make it consistent with other sections, moving illegal accessory apartments to make it less confusing. One 4-2a.c.3 under animal order is too broad. Discussion ensued on a third-party hearing officer for disputes, the code already has the mayor can appoint a third party. Deputy Munson recommends putting in intent", any order can be offensive and is very subjective and comes down to intent. Councilmember Person recommended adding "purposely" annoys...". E1 "uninhabitable building" needs to be better defined. Councilmember Thompson recommends changing in the definition- building to residence and everything else is a structure Councilmember Peterson will strike unfit for human habitation. Councilmember Willis - under J, change wording deleterious to harmful to be easier to understand and referring to the IBC/IRC like the code does when it refers to the state code. Councilmember Peterson stated the IBC/IRC is not free to access. Council Willis stated a fire hazard and gangs needs to be better defined and signs remove the word exstand, better define vandalism, construction section TT is missing. Councilmember Abbott stated in QQ the reference is incorrect and needs to be corrected to 76-10-5. Discussion ensued on the number of vehicles permitted to park in the front of a home, code states they have to be registered but was unsure how to say a home can have x number of cars if they are all registered and parking within code. Councilmember Peterson stated Article B is the enforcement part of the nuisance code. The additions made were law enforcement, fire marshal or other authorized
