28	Mayor Haddock stated in the last legislative session funds were approved to help smaller cities with some					
29	certain administrative things. Sheri Pippin from Mountainland is here to explain those items. Sheri has					
30	already helped with the general plan through Horrocks Engineering as part of the program that was funded.					
31	Sheri went over the top concerns cities have.					
32 33	The biggest item is growth and how to manage it while protecting property owner rights without being run over. The state has a pool for licensed professionals to help with reviewing code. Since the population of					
33	the city is under 5000 Elk Ridge has until December 31, 2024, to have the subdivision code updated. The					
35	city will be officially notified by the state when the 5000 threshold has been reached. This is based on					
36	population in the last census. The 2023 legislation passed a bill that city council will no longer have					
37	preliminary approval of subdivisions. They will be approved by staff, or the Planning Commission.					
38	Everything should be done during preliminary approval, stubs, addressing, all infrastructure etc. so when					
39	the Council sees final approval it should be ready to print the mylar and begin construction. The state is					
40	working on a water commission to help cities with water rights.					
41	Transparency is another item of concern. Sheri, if needed, would help the city with a report on the budget					
42	detailing where all monies go for example a base rate of \$30 for water- \$15 goes to pay for electricity to					
43	pump water, \$10 goes to pay for infrastructure, \$5 goes to administration for billing and administration. It					
44 45	could show why budgets are being projected to be X amount. Contacting a legislator individually is better than a petition; petitions get ignored. On funding: The governor's office of planning and budget has a					
43 46	website portal to hundreds of financial resources for cities that have everything from infrastructure loans					
40 47	and grants to community park programs for communities that have a lot of senior citizens. Some funding					
48	requires matches, some do not. Mayor Haddock stated Burgess Owens' office visited the city and said					
49	there is a 5 million fund set up for certain cities to help with funding for projects but there has to be a plan					
50	in place. Sheri will look into that.					
51	Personnel is another concern. Some cities have full time city managers, others have city administrators.					
52	The difference is in how the city crafts the position's duties. The city should have a contract with someone					
53	who reviews and drafts memos on developments. The contract planner should draft code and look for					
54	contradictions in the code. Developers pay for this through the application fees. Elk Ridge's first priority at					
55	the moment is to appoint a treasurer.					

56	Another item of concern was getting help with ordinances and resolutions. The first few enabling					
57	paragraphs, the whereases, sets up what the city is doing, who's doing it and where the authority comes					
58	from. Whereas paragraphs are not binding; The section that comes after "Now therefore" or "be it					
59	ordained" or "be it resolved" that states what is being changed; that is the actual binding clause. Sheri					
60	thanked the council for the opportunity to come and talk with the council and planning commission and if					
61	there are any other concerns or questions to contact her.

63	Discussion ensued on the date for the city celebration which was set for June 14th. Ron Gailey will chair					
64	the event. Councilmember Willis would like to add another movie night.					
65	Ron Gailey would like look into having electricity or hookups put in at the new park for food trucks.					
66	Ryan Bybee would like to talk to the council regarding the commercial property and council thoughts as to					
67	possibly mix use nice brick fenced storage units. He will be on the agenda in February.
