19	WORK SESSION						
20	SESD PRESENTATION						
21	Mark Holdaway and Dan Elsworth of SESD stated a year ago SESD implemented a substantial						
22	rate increase and there was a lot of misinformation about the increase. Mark Holdaway went						
23	through a spread sheet and explained what happened to force the increase. There are many						
24	different sources used to generate power. About 5 years ago a California Company spread to the						
25	neighboring states and started using those resources to create energy for California and that						
26	started pushing up the prices. In 2023 power prices went crazy. A Nebo gas plant near Payson						
27	had to shut down for significant repairs, which left SESD exposed to the open market. Gas and						
28	other prices also shot up at that time. At that time SESD was paying 18 cents per kilowatt of						
29	power, which typically was 7-8 cents per kilowatt. SESD had to use its reserves and it nearly						
30	killed SESD. Material costs had gone up, transformer cost doubled. In the last 5 years power						
31	poles went from \$5000 a pole to \$17,000 a pole. There were supply chain issues due to the						
32	pandemic that affected the cost of everything. Because of everything the board decided it had to						
33	implement a 40% increase. This last winter was a good water year, which helped stabilize the						
34	cost. SESD forecasts prices to remain stable through the year. SESD purchased a flat block (?) to						
35	help maintain prices. The open market is expected to go up due to the hot summer that is						
36	expected. California is also expected to remain in the SESD's open market. The renewal power						
37	that goes through a converter is damaging transformers and regulators nationwide. The small						
38 39	modular nuclear project to be built in Idaho is dead at the moment. SESD has been working very hard to purchase power from other sources to keep things stabilized. Coal was being						
39 40	decommissioned all over the place until the co-ops stood up and said no, we will not shut down.						
40	Rocky Mountain Power was scheduled to close a lot of their power plants but because of the						
42	legislation that was past implementing a rigorous process to ensure grid reliability, coal mines						
43	cannot shut down, so they left the plants open. SESD has made power purchase contacts that will						
44	keep things hopefully stabilized Anyone getting solar needs to get a battery. Solar rates compared						
44	to Rocky Mountain Power are identical. The kilowatt allowed went up from 10kw to 25 kw.						
46	SESD power rate was a little higher than Rocky Mountain before the increase, now SESD is						
47	higher than everyone. Rocky Mountain is getting ready to raise its rates which will be equal to						
48	SESD's. Everyone else is catching up and will be as high as SESD. The council would like to put						
49	tips in the newsletter of ways to be more efficient and save money.
