17	WORK SESSION GENERAL PLAN
18 19	Andrew Jackson stated the General Plan is a guideline. East of the Mississippi is called a
20	comprehensive plan, in the west it is called a General Plan. They are the same thing. It is
20	comprehensive in scope meaning it covers a lot of different items. It's comprehensive in scope
21	but it's general in guidance. <u>Councilmember Willis</u> stated she uses the General Plan quite a bit,
22	her first year she used it a ton. The council works on the shoulders of those who came before
23 24	them and tries to keep a cohesive vision which is the purpose of the General Plan. When the
25	council works on code, she goes through the General Plan to see if it fulfills the purpose of the
25 26	General Plan and uses it as a very strong reference guide. The state website has items that are
20 27	required to be in the General Plan and asked if education and public buildings need to be in the
28	General Code and does the council want that included in the General Plan? <u>Andrew Jackson</u>
20 29	stated Utah Code <u>10-9-A 401</u> states they are not required but may be put in the General Plan if
30	the council feels strongly about it. <u>Mayor Haddock</u> stated how would putting a placeholder in the
31	General Plan for those items change your perspective sitting in that seat? There are no specifics
32	on education at this time. <u>Maureen Bushman</u> stated that she contacted the school district, and the
33	Elk Ridge property is still considered viable but there is not the population growth to support a
34	school, so it is not on the school districts list for building for this time period. The school district
35	looks at the entire school district. If the school district ever deems the property as not viable then
36	it would be sold. That is the school district's choice, and the city would have no say other than
37	having an opportunity to buy it. Stating anything in the General Plan about what the city would
38	like to do with education property would be misleading because the city really doesn't have any
39	control over that other than saying the property is there. It is on the map, and it is labeled
40	correctly. <u>Councilmember Willis</u> stated then maybe that is all we need. <u>Councilmember</u>
41	Thompson stated it would be a waste of time to include anything on education. Councilmember
42	Paxton stated if the city had any education buildings, then perhaps but doesn't see the need to
43	include education. <u>Councilmember Willis</u> asked about public buildings being included. Does the
44	city need to include any future plans for a new city building? <u>Andrew Jackson</u> stated no. It's
45	basically transportation, modern income housing that are required. There will be a point Dec. 31,
46	2025, when the city will need to include a water use preservation element. Other items listed for
47	the general plan are optional. The city isn't putting in a big commercial project so that was

removed. Councilmember Wixom asked if the city was able to put anything on the highway? 48 Would the city be able to annex down to the highway? Councilmember Willis brought the area up 49 on the screen and the road and area are county. Andrew Jackson explained how a city has to put 50 in a 5, 10, 20-year plan and servicing that area. Councilmember Wixom stated the city needs to at 51 least look at annexing the road down to the highway and some land. Andrew Jackson stated you 52 can put anything on your annexation map. When the city adopts the annexation declaration policy 53 there needs to be public hearings and such. Maureen Bushman asked if the council wanted to 54 change the annexation map now. Mayor Haddock, Royce Swensen, and Councilmember Wixom 55 all agreed that the map is good for now and more discussion would have to happen to add any 56 more annexation areas. Maureen Bushman stated the city now has access to maps and has the 57 option to change them as needed. Councilmember Willis recommended shortening the history 58 and removing the second paragraph and add a chart from page 31. Andrew Jackson stated a hot 59 link can be added to jump to the population map. Councilmember Willis recommended adding 60 color and more pictures. The acreage on developed land needs to match the graph on page 34, 61 Page 5 sentence needs to remove preserving the natural look and add language about the WUI. 62 The code was not made to keep the area beautiful, it was a safety issue. Discussion ensued on the 63 zone designation. Recommendation is to add "approximately" before the acreage. Discussion 64 ensued on page 6 removing language after environmental hazards, adding language of complying 65 to the code and add a hyperlink to the code. Add hyperlinks to code anywhere zones are 66 mentioned. Andrew Jackson stated the map needs to be changed to the land use map and not the 67 zone map. Councilmember Willis stated the slopes on the sensitive areas are gone and the map is 68 significantly different and needs to be reevaluated and to double check the ridgelines. The 69 transportation map will be revised and updated to match code for OHVs. Discussion ensued on 70 page 15 on the language for emergencies and what is a large subdivision and when is a traffic 71 study required and removing any code specifics and referring to the code. Discussion ensued on 72 adding "private property" to the south end of the city and does it belong in the general plan and 73 adding dotted lines to Olympic Lane, Elk Ridge Dr, and Canyon View to show a possible future 74 road for connectivity. Discussion ensued on E bikes and other motorized vehicles being allowed 75 on trails and sidewalks and speed limits, which will need to be addressed in the city code. Ron 76 Hill proposed taking the trail lines off undeveloped south area on the map completely and say 77 private property has no access and will be determined during development. Discussion ensued on 78 this is a future map and the General Plan has to have the lines in order to protect the city plan in 79 having the trails required during development in the future. Councilmember Willis is concerned 80 with the moderate-income housing section. Mayor Haddock stated the US census is the official 81 population used to determine requirements, the city is under 5000. Discussion ensued and the 82 section will be revised to state the city will comply with state code for the moderate-income 83 housing when the population requirement of 5000 is met. 84

The council thanked the planning Commission for all the hours of hard work they did on the general plan and gave them a hand.

Mayor Haddock stated he, Royce Swensen and Jerry Clark went to a meeting and through a
conversation with a gentleman from Ephraim in which they learned that Ephraim used a federal
lobbyist to get grants. A firm contacted the mayor, and he would like to look into this and listen

90	to a presentation. Andrew Jackson recommended asking Mike McKell if he knew any lobbyist he
91	would recommend and look at state lobbyists as well, and make sure any firm is top tier.
