43	1. FEDERAL FUNDING GRANT DISCUSSION								
44	Mayor Haddock presented Mark McIntyre Principal and Founder and Brandon Bookout Co-								
45	Founder of Amplio Services– and are federal lobbyists the proposal is 6500 for a 90-day trial.								
46	<u>Mark McIntyre</u> stated they want this to be a good partnership, so they have the trial period to								
40 47	make it easy for the city to fire them if it's not a good fit. They work with local governments and								
48	other types of nonprofits who don't have money to burn. There is an unprecedented amount of								

federal funding flowing out of Washington DC for local governments especially rural local 49 governments. All of the money they win for Elk Ridge will have been authorized and 50 appropriated by the US Congress. He is a Ronald Reagan conservative, he is fiscally 51 conservative which means every dollar they win will not add a dime to the federal budget. There 52 are billions of dollars flowing to red states and they work for numerous entities all over the 53 country. In Utah they have previously succeeded in Salt Lake, they currently represent Uintah 54 Valley Technical College where they have achieved a 14-1 ROI. Elk Ridge as a local government 55 has much more to market than a technical college at the federal level. Brandon Bookman stated 56 57 there is a boat load of federal funding available for the city's priority needs. The mayor asked for them to highlight specifically federal support for both parks and trails. Their firm has a long 58 history of securing major dollars for both parks and trails for local governments exactly like Elk 59 Ridge. For example, they recently secured 5.7 million to construct a trail in a city in Oregon, in 60 Massachusetts they secured \$700,000 for park improvements, in addition, for dollars that are 61 available for construction there are also planning grants available in these categories to help fund 62 engineering and environmental assessment needs that need to take place before construction 63 begins. They routinely help secure planning grants because it helps to fund those projects the city 64 is going to do anyway as a project unfolds. Their firm performs the lion share of the work. Local 65 governments retain agencies like ours because everyone in the city has a day job. Councilmember 66 Wixom asked what the timeline is typically from start to finish in this process. Answer- It is 67 different for each grant. It takes 1 year to identify the grant, prepare the grant, and receive the 68 grant. We do as many grants during the course of a year and as many congressional earmarks 69 70 through an appropriation cycle as the city internal capacity allows. The government will spend several trillion dollars of our taxpayer money. The bad news is it requires patience. The bottom 71 line is at the end of each year either we deliver a good return on investment, or you throw us 72 Utah Lake. We have spoken with your mayor and have done a little homework about your city, 73 and we know that just like your professional staff each of you has a day job and the bottom line is 74 the bottom line. We exist to achieve a strong ROI for the governments that we serve. 75 Councilmember Willis asked if the contract is \$6,500 a month? Mayor Haddock confirmed yes, 76 it's \$19,500 for the first 90 days. Councilmember Willis stated the city realistically shouldn't 77 expect a return in 90 days. Answer - If you look at the federal funding action plan you will see 78 that there are very specific deliverables. In that first 90 days they meet with all of the key people 79 in the state, the city's professional staff, all of you who have jurisdiction over your party funding 80 needs. We are going to go deep into the different needs of the city and create a comprehensive 81 federal funding strategy and the centerpiece of the strategy is a federal funding grid. The city will 82 be able to see in black and white what the grants they can identify, what is the awards ceiling, 83 what are the fundable activities, and when are they due. You can imagine based on those due 84 dates that a very specific action plan develops immediately. The city will be able to see what the 85 actual potential return on investment is based on how many billions of dollars those grants 86 represent. In those first 90 days if there is a federal grant that is forecast to be open or is open, 87 they are not going to wait until day 91 to attack it. They will work with the city's team to draft the 88 application. This is a highly measurable accountable scope of work. Councilmember Willis stated 89 that is probably the part that seems the most valuable for the city because we knew federal money 90 was coming available and they let us know on Friday and it was due on Tuesday. Forecasting and 91 projecting out when a grant is coming available, and the application is already being drafted is 92 what the city can't do on our own. The key element on the scope of work for their firm in serving 93 Elk Ridge is that forecasting component so most folks set their hair on fire when there is a grant 94 opportunity due in a couple days or even 60 days. We forecast opportunities 6, 7, 9 months in 95 advance so they can start working on those applications and ensure that as they work through the 96 97 application development process, they check every single one of the competitive preference priorities they can and ensure the application is award worthy. Councilmember Wixom asked if 98 the grants have to be approved by congress or is there an administration arm that does that? 99

Answer- The competitive grants come from each individual agency, such as if we pursue funds 100 for trails or parks and rec from either the Department of Agriculture or The Department of the 101 Interior. Congressional earmarks, which effectively are grants that members of congress write 102 into the appropriations bills, come directly from congress. Councilmember Wixom asked how 103 often does that happen, is it an ongoing process throughout the year, is it their fiscal year? 104 Answer- Under the US constitution the sole power of the federal purse resides with the US 105 Congress. Under the constitution the congress is required to pass 12 separate appropriation bills 106 each year. Right now, the congress is working FY25 (fiscal year) those dollars flow down from 107 Capitol Hill to the different agencies and there are annual federal grant programs that they will 108 target on behalf of Elk Ridge. They will pursue dollars from both of those categories in 109 competitive grants and directly from the congress. Councilmember Wixom which items such as 110 infrastructure versus trails versus water allocations etc. are the toughest and most competitive that 111 you have found? Answer- this is my 39 legislative cycle, and he has taken the word easy out of 112 the firm's vocabulary. All of these dollars are competitive which by definition means all of these 113 dollars are difficult to get, they are all competitive. One of the most competitive is the 114 Department of Transportation's Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and 115 Equity raise grant program which has an award ceiling of \$25 million- one their clients was 116 awarded \$17.2 million and is proud to say that their firm has won 4 raise grants. In the context 117 118 for the most competitive program that Elk Ridge can apply for is probably raise grants which their firm has a pretty good track record. All 4 of those grants were for red states. All 4 of those 119 grants were for states that Joe Biden is not going to step one foot into. Councilmember Peterson 120 asked if Elk Ridge is successful in getting a grant, what is usually the process? Answer- Each 121 grant is different, long story short there is a draw down process they help the city do so Elk Ridge 122 gets the dollars as quickly and expeditiously as possible. Once the agency or congress awards the 123 grant, they want the project implemented as quickly as possible. Councilmember Willis asked if 124 they make sure everything is in compliance every step of the way after that? Answer-Yes. 125 Councilmember Paxman asked if they ever had a city that you have not won a grant for? Answer-126 there have been cities in the past during the first 90 days they decided mutually that it was not a 127 good fit either because their projects were not fundable, or they lacked the internal capacity to 128 maximize their services. Councilmember Wixom asked in addition to the monthly fee, are there 129 any other fees charged or a part of the % of the grant taken? Answer- Elk Ridge will have a 130 crystal-clear budget certainty, there are no work-related expenses, there are no extra fees. They 131 work on a monthly fee because it is illegal for an agency like ours to be paid anything out of the 132 grant. Councilmember Thompson would like to see the actual contract.
