14	COUNCILMEMBER WILLIS MOTIONED TO OPEN THE JOINT WORK SESSION WITH						
15	THE PLANNING COMMISION COUNCILMEMBER PAXTON SECONDED ALL AYE						
16	VOTE AYE (4) NAY (0) APPROVED

18	Cory Thompson absent						
19 20	Jorie Britt and Rory McWhorter and Ron Gailey of the Planning Commission and the Parks and						
20 21	<u>Trails Committee</u> went through different features and ideas presented to the public at the city						
21	celebration and the online survey. There were 890 completed surveys, there were a few surveys						
22	from other cities that were removed. That is about $\frac{1}{3}$ of the adult population of Elk Ridge. There						
24	was a good balance of age, gender and areas. Walking trails, splash pad and natural water feature						
25	were very strong. Pavilions and an event center came in higher than the city office, city office						
26	came in at about 10% everything else fell off quite a bit. Sports elements were lower since pickle						
27	ball courts are going to be built in the Sky Hawk Park. The all-abilities playground was high.						
28	<u>Melanie Paxton</u> stated the difference in the online survey and the vote at the city celebration were						
29	because during the city celebration they spoke with everyone who voted and let them know that						
30	trails would be included in all designs of the park. That that is why the mountain bike course						
31	played a much higher role than in the online survey where it wasn't even mentioned. Children						
32	voted during the celebration, but no surveys were from children. Councilmember Willis stated the						
33	survey results need to be posted on the city website and on social media. The actual results of the						
34	surveys are not reflected from those on Facebook. The percentage of the opinions on Facebook						
35	(not an official city Facebook page), though loud, are the minority. Ron Gailey continued with						
36	the result details. The highest percentage of surveyors stated they would rather have something						
37	great/good that was reasonable with funding and not raising taxes. Many residents are in favor of						
38	donation of equipment. <u>Councilmember Wixom</u> stated the cost estimate of a park is 3 million						
39 40	dollars and asked if the \$40 (estimate) in higher property taxes included maintenance of the						
40	parks? <u>Ron Gailey</u> stated it only covered the construction of a park and did not take into account						
41	any grants or impact fees. These surveys teach the council what the residents are interested in and						
42	what they are willing to do so that the city can better plan for a park. <u>Ron Gailey</u> also stated those who have been in the city 15 years or longer are a lot less likely to support a park, those who have						
43 44	lived here for 4 years are more likely to support this. All the demographics and what residence						
44 45	will support can be seen on the survey. <u>Councilmember Willis</u> stated if it is done by multi phasing						
43 46	and includes the impact fee and grants a park may be digestible and may not need tax dollars.						
40 47	<u>Councilmember Paxton</u> stated Nancy, the grant writer, said she had never not received funding						
48	for a second phase if a grant was received for the first phase. Jorie Britt stated the features that						
49	can bring in revenue are an event center and the skate ribbon. <u>Rory McWhorter</u> recommends						
50	natural elements such as rocks, pond, stream, the ability playground, pavilions, and trails. It was						

- 51 recommended to narrow down the recommendation committee to 3-4 people and develop a more 52 defined plan.

He spoke with Ron Nielsen of the 83 DWR and he said the state leaves it up to the cities for deer population counts. Who put up the 84 general liability bond required by the state? He doesn't like the assumptions on the deer and 85 doesn't think the city should live on assume. He also has a complaint about the water rates and 86 the people are furious about the high-water bills. He was told the water pipes were cast iron and 87 shown a piece of pipe cast iron pipe that had been torn out by a resident. He doesn't think there 88 are any cast iron pipes in the city. Mayor Haddock confirmed those pipes were ductile iron. The 89 city is assuming that the pipes all needed to be torn out. Ductile iron is still being put in current in 90 cities. Don't put a well down low, put a well up high. Do your homework and don't assume. 91 92 1. JONES AND DEMILLE CAPITAL FACILITIES PRESENTATION 93 Micklane Farmer and Matthew Lenhart of Jones and DeMille presented the draft for the 94 transportation master plan which will be part of the capital facilities. They went through the maps 95 and the transportation study and analyzed the road width standards and street designations. The 96
- population is taken from the latest US Census, Growth estimates are only predictions. Street
  designations such as major or minor arterials, local, collectors etc. are based on the amount of

traffic. Future roads should have designations so the designations can be required when the area is 99 developed. UDOT doesn't do traffic counts, cities; are expected to do a study every 5 years or so. 100 The traffic study showed the busiest roads are Park Dr and Goosenest Dr. The traffic study can be 101 used to determine future use for example: a study shows the speed of drivers, if 85% of the 102 drivers are driving at a speed of 35 mph the city could raise that speed limit to 35 mph. The 103 104 transportation plan shows future projects and costs estimates. Development standards which include road width standards, park strips, and road infrastructure, need to be updated every 5 105 years and available online. Council will review the transportation section, and a public hearing 106 107 will be needed before the transportation master plan can be adopted.

Michael Hartvigsen of Jones and DeMille presented the Capital Facilities culinary and sewer 109 section and state requirements. The storage system analysis is more than sufficient to get the 110 current residential units. The well system will need to be increased as the population increases by 111 112 2034-2044 (projection) and recommend placing a well high to mitigate pumping costs. The water rights were analyzed, and the city owns sufficient water rights and discussion ensued on leasing 113 excess water rights to cover costs on rights that have continued expenses of annual fees. The city 114 has a broker that is looking into this and needed this report. The water model is complicated and 115 there are 5 areas that need prv's to be installed to meet pressure requirements and fire flow 116 capacities. Discussion unused on how each PRV (pressure release vault) will increase fire flow 117 and increase or decrease pressure. Several pipelines need to be upsized to increase fire flow. Elk 118 Ridge Dr is already planned to be done after the lower part of Elk Ridge Dr is opened. A priority 119 list with dates will be created. The sewer model needs elevation data. The one area of concern is 120 along 11200 south which may have backup once the city hits build out. This line is shared with 121 Woodland Hills which could make backup more of a concern, but these lines are owned by 122 Payson. 123

# 2. SPENCER FOSTER LOCAL ADMINISTRATIVE ADVISOR, MAG

<u>Mayor Haddock</u> stated Spencer Foster is with MAG. <u>Spencer Foster</u> stated he is the local administrator advisor. The smaller cities went to the state and requested help and funds were allocated to help with administrative matters. To qualify a city has to be under 10,000 population. The types of problems they can help with are listed on the website, https://mountainland.org/laa/ To request assistance a Project Scoping Form needs to be submitted by the authorized personnel. ULCT also has training videos that count towards council training for the year.

# 3. SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY RESOLUTION

<u>Spencer Foster</u> created the social media policy. This will create guidelines and consistent communication with the residence. This draft will be revised to more accurately fit the city social media needs.

# 4. <u>GENERAL PLAN</u>

Andrew Jackson will get the official current population figure that should be used for consistency 139 on the General Plan and the Capital Facilities plan. The slope data was done through Lidar and is 140 more accurate than the previous map but could have inaccurate data due to shadows and it is 141 stated in the building permit process slope data is required to be done per lot. ADUs and home 142 occupation language will be added to all areas allowed by code. High density areas language will 143 144 be revised, and the second sentence removed. Dark Sky will be revised to include residential. The trail through the Barton property needs to be moved to Hillside Dr. Councilmember Paxton 145 recommends putting the trail on the ridgeline. The asterisks for future trails stating the private 146 property no public access needs to be removed. It's too broad a statement and on all the future 147 trails, revise to say future trail. Councilmember Peterson asked if the city needed to use the major 148 and minor arterial road labels. Andrew Jackson stated they were removed because it was splitting 149

150		hairs between the major and minor roads. Councilmember Peterson stated the definitions may					
151		need to be tweaked and remove the word "may".
