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3. <u>RESOLUTION 24-11-12-2R AWARD PARK CONTRACT -DESIGN AND</u> ENGINEERING

<u>Mayor Haddock</u> stated the city received 5 bids, City Council and Planning Commission all agreed on the number 1 pick. <u>Councilmember Paxton</u> stated she presented the park to the Outdoor recreation initiative (ORI) and asked for funds for the design and engineering bid amount of \$36,560. The city would have to match 20%. The decision will be made late November by ORI.

Discussion ensued on the amount of bid which would be done in 3 phases. The cost of the park is 50 estimated to be 3 million. The city can apply for multiple grants for one project. The ORI wants 51 to grant funds to projects that are more likely to be successful. Councilmember Thompson stated 52 he did an informal poll, and the result was the residents he spoke with were in favor of the park as 53 long as the pickleball courts at Sky Hawk Park were built. Councilmember Paxton stated the 54 pickle ball courts would be done first. Councilmember Paxton stated that Curtis Roberts 55 confirmed that the Park Impact fees can be used for all the parks, they are not collected for 56 specific parks. Councilmember Willis would like the attorney to confirm that. The number 1 bid 57 is Civil Science. Councilmember Paxton stated the city needs to approve the 30% for phase 1 58 which is \$49,800 in order to go for grants in January. Councilmember Wixom asked what the 59 burden to the city would be, how much it would be to maintain the completed park. The city 60 needs to be sensitive to the aging residents and what their tax dollars are being used on. 61 Councilmember Willis stated they asked that maintenance be minimized by minimizing green 62 grass, and to have a holding tank if they do have a water feature to help water any grass. This is a 63 nature park and having scrub oak etc. is part of the design. Maintenance projections are part of 64 the number 1 bid. Councilmember Peterson stated the city did a survey and lots of residents 65 wanted a park as long as it did not raise taxes and appreciates that the city is applying for and 66 looking ahead at grants. A poll vote was taken, and he had had an issue with taking a poll vote on 67 park funds. Poll votes are for emergencies, and this is not a need but a want and not an emergency 68 and he is glad that this is being discussed. It was very resounding that the community does not 69 want their taxes raised. What are the legalities of an official poll vote, 3 out of 5 voted to approve 70 a bid, is the city held legally to that. No one appeared to be changing their vote. 71

- 82 4. SUBDIVISION CODE AMENDMENT

Councilmember Willis stated there are a lot of areas in the development code that have areas in 83 the HR1 and CE3 code where the city council decides such as road grades, curbing and other 84 special provisions. The development code and the subdivision code are intertwined. If the city 85 council no longer makes those determinations, who does? This needs clarification from the 86 Hansen Group. Council determined that SRC meetings need to be noticed and public when 87 making decisions. Royce Swensen was able to get Jacob Hansen on the phone. Jacob Hansen (via 88 telephone) stated those decisions are a gray area. If council is comfortable with the Planning 89 90 Commission making those decisions, then the code can be changed and insert the Planning Commission into those items or require special approval before an application is submitted. Since 91 the Planning Commission already had a public hearing, the city does not have to have another 92 public hearing for further changes. Discussion ensued on the 180-day rule for amending a code 93 and once a city has started amending a code the city has 180 to pass the code during which time 94 any application submitted falls under the new amendments. Jacob Hansen mentioned placing a 95 moratorium and he was unclear as to that provision and would have to check. (The city received 96 the state code with explanation from Mike Hansen) The first order of business would be to adopt 97 what the city has so far and then amend the rest of the code. Councilmember Wixom asked if the 98 Planning Commission really has the authority to make exceptions to the code? Jacob Hansen 99 stated the council could include a provision that the subdivision code supersedes all development 100 code, put a moratorium on zones that are affected, or pass what the council has as is, or roll the 101 dice and or wait and over the next month and half the edits can be made and the council can pass 102 this is January or February. Those provisions in questions could be cleaned up and modified in 103 the city standards. Mayor Haddock asked if the committee decision had to be unanimous; is that 104 regardless of how many committee members are voting? Jacob Hansen stated the way it is 105 currently written states it has to be unanimous no matter if its 3 or 5 members. Mayor Haddock 106 stated the city would like that changed to a majority; if there are only 3 members (a quorum) 107 voting, it has to be unanimous. Councilmember Willis would like the subdivision trails language 108 clearer that if there is a trail on the trail map it had to go in the subdivision. Jacob Hansen stated 109 the City Council retains control of the development agreement and the performance bonds for 110 durability. Mayor Haddock stated the code needs to be passed in the December meeting. All the 111 questions and changes, and the development code will be discussed again. Councilmember 112 Peterson went through the questions and restated the changes to them. SRC needs to have a 113 public meeting when taking action and majority vote as stated previously; the Mayor appoints 114 committee members and council approves and removes members, council recommends council 115 116 member, planning commission recommends a planning commission member. There was no determination on time of services. 2-2-4 changes to provision 2, Delete unfinished line on page 9. 117 Road still needs to be changed 3.5 minimum or as stated in city standards. Page 22 Trails code 118 119 needs to be drafted. Councilmember Paxton and Councilmember Willis stated asphalt trails are more desirable to trail users than concrete. Councilmember Peterson is still concerned about the 120 storm water chart. Vehicular access to infrastructure shall be defined by city engineer as well 121 implementing the code as to who maintains ponds. 122
